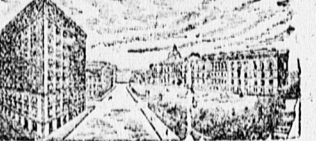

Miss Howard and Miss Lowther, Cornwall, who have spent the past year visiting in the western states, are en route for home. They expect to be in Cornwall early next week.

Rev. Canon Simpson of St. Peter's Cathedral, City, leaves this week for Windsor, N. S., where he will attend the Eucenia week exercises at the college there. Canon Simpson will be the Alumni Orator.

C. M. Howatt, the popular representative of the Frost & Wood Co., was among the passengers on the western train Saturday afternoon, returning to his home in French River after spending a few days in this city.

The Government Patrol boat Ostrea, which has been blocked up on the landing next to the Marine Wharf all winter, was launched on Saturday. She will be fitted out immediately and prepared for the season's work.

The latest development in the case between Rev. R. W. Robinson, of the Ludlow Street Baptist church, and the authorities of that denomination, it is understood, is that steps have been taken by the congregation to call a meeting on May 17 on the matter.

Some time ago the ministerial oversight committee of the church attempted to take up the charges. On that occasion Rev. Mr. Robinson was represented before the gathering by A. A. Wilson, K. C., who called in question the jurisdiction of the committee. After some discussion the meeting adjourned and the matter was referred to the executive of the association. That body declared as a result of their deliberations, that the ministerial committee had ample jurisdiction with the matter. It was, however, thought best to allow the congregation to deal with the matter if they would do so. They were therefore given the option of calling a council or submitting the whole to the ministerial oversight committee.

It was reported yesterday that the ministerial committee might now deal with the whole matter without further reference to the congregation. Whether this step is taken or not it is expected to be brought up at the annual meeting of the provincial conference to be held in July.—St. John Ex. (Rev. Mr. Robinson is well known here.)

On Tuesday last Rev. J. W. Wadman, Honolulu, had a very narrow escape from death. He and C. P. Hong were driving from Waimea, Hawaii, to Kohala, and one of the horses hitched to the buggy was a youngster. All went well for a mile or so past Waimea, but then the bolt took fright at a road roller and booted. The other horse became excited and quickly got into its stride also. The Japanese driver became frightened and before Mr. Wadman or Hong could grab the lines the two maddened animals were away at top speed. A high bank on the side of the road was charged by the team and in an instant the buggy was capsize and the occupants pinned beneath the hood of the vehicle. The kicking, rearing horses plunged ahead and Mr. Wadman was dragged along the ground. The other two were also in the mix-up. Finally, when the horses had broken free from the buggy, they picked up Mr. Wadman, who was in a bad way. Bruised from head to foot, face cut open and eyes blackened, the reverend gentleman looked as if he had been through a rock crusher. Mr. Wadman's injuries were treated and he was put to bed. The well known pastor boarded the Mauna Kea at Mahukona and he then still bore scars that told of his narrow escape from death.—Honolulu Advertiser, Apr 16.—Rev. Mr. Wadman is a native of this Province and at one time was pastor of Grace Church, city.)

The Auxiliary of the W. M. S. and mission band of the Cornwall Methodist Church held their annual business meeting and election of officers, on Thursday afternoon. These societies have done good work during the past year; five life members have been added to the roll of the W. M. S.; Mrs. H. Crosby, Mrs. J. Mayhew, Mrs. J. Stone, Mrs. S. Frizzelle, and Miss Kellogg. Two have been added to the band; Mrs. W. Lowther, and Miss Hattie Drake. At the close of the business meeting officers for the ensuing year were elected. The amount raised by these societies for the year just closed, amounts to the handsome sum of \$207, the largest amount ever raised in one year.

TO WED MAN WHO NAMED EX-HUSBAND AS A CO-RESPONDENT.

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., May 2—Herbert W. Pattee, who in 1904 sued his wife for divorce, naming Henry A. Solis as correspondent, and who was afterwards sued by his wife who named Mrs. Mary A. Swain, then known also as Alice M. Swain, has taken out a license to marry Mrs. Swain.

This is the latest development in one of the most remarkable tangles of marital confusions New England has ever known.

In 1904 Mrs. Swain was an attractive divorcee, who had been twice married, once to Henry A. Solis, the man named by her present husband to be in his suit against his wife at that time. She was then acting as book-keeper for Pattee on his farm at Reading, and was alleged to have stolen the affections of Pattee by Mrs. Pattee.

Pattee is now 53 years old and his lance is 28. In 1908 Pattee filed a petition of bankruptcy.

The Rev. Charles H. Emmons of the Universalist Church here will marry the couple and the wedding has been arranged for Thursday.
