WILSON AND O'HARA IN N. S. FINALS

Court Rivals To Again Meet; Final Stages Reached In All But Mixed Doubles

Mrs. J.C.I. Edwards Advances To Meet Mrs. Harold Jones Defending Champion In Women's Singles Event.

HALIFAX, Aug. 16—Harry Roper, Nova Scotia's last hope in the singles of the Nova Scotia senior tennis tournament, was eliminated easily today as Joe O'Hara of Ottawa and Ross Wilson advanced to the finals. The Ontario stars met in the finals of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island tournaments and Wilson won both titles. O'Hara, the able, fishman whose smile has made him a favorite with the spectators, had too much to do today as he defeated Roper in the left-handed Haligonian in a hard-fought win over the veteran Mrs. F. V. Woodbury of Halifax. Scores were 7-5, 6-4.

Around The Rail At The Race Track

Workouts started at 6:30 yesterday morning and continued up until 3 o'clock in the afternoon, some stables not being able to work all of their string in the morning. The track was fast but not within one second or possibly two seconds as it will be on Tuesday.

The highlights of the day were the miles paced by Marjorie M. and Hi Socks. The Sydney mare, minus the hobbles, paced in 2:10 3/5 and the Summerside two-year-old made the spectators gasp with the fastest mile ever stepped by a 2 year old in the Maritime Provinces. This beautiful colt is by Bud Akworthy, 2:14, out of a Captain Aubrey mare. Other good workouts were Bonnie Cameron, mile in 2:12 1/2, last quarter in 31 seconds; Sampson Hal paced a mile in 2:12 1/2; Lusty Frisco trotted in 2:18; Helen D. trotted in 2:15 1/4; Star 1, paced in 2:12 1/2, and August Queen in 2:17.

Two good workouts were recorded by two Middleton, Nova Scotia, horses. Miss McTear and Holly-wood Lee trotted like a team in 2:12 3/4. Other workouts were Miss Victoria, two year old pace, 2:31; Jackie Volo, also a two year old, was clocked 2:32; Chaney Tipton in 2:18; Im Alone in 2:15; Peter B. trotted in 2:18.

The three year old Bud Aubrey, winner of two year old Futurity last fall, was a mile in 2:27, one and a half seconds better than the record he made last fall. There were many more good workouts, but our "clocker" missed them.

Today will be one of the final training up days before the parade which starts Tuesday afternoon. The grandstand and bleachers will be shut off to spectators as they will be receiving an overhauling and scrubbing.

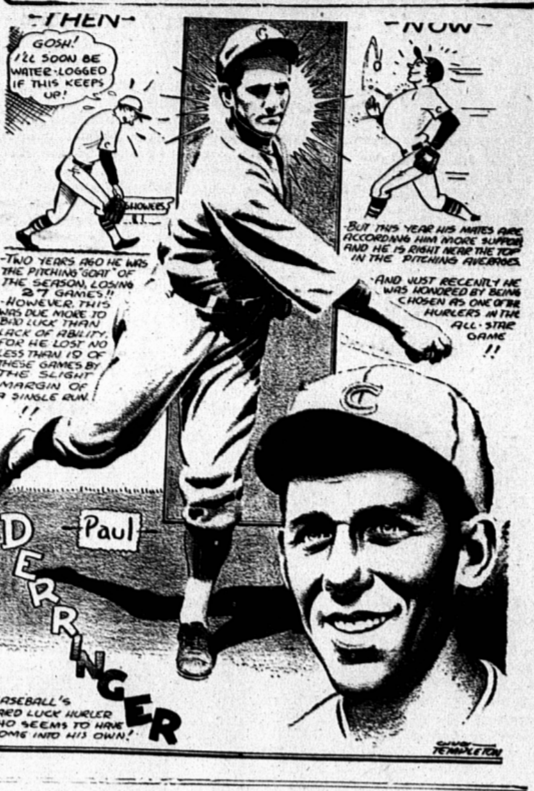
On the other hand however the Linkletter squad have been playing good ball and will enter a strong team in a league which is to be formed next season. For the remainder of this year exhibition games only will be played.

Canuck Cadets Retain The Faraday Cup

CONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGES
South March, Ont., Aug. 16.—A great day of shooting under a torrid sun brought the big annual meeting of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association to its climax—tomorrow's final stage of the Governor-General's match.

The sun, beating down on the ranges brought a difficult mirage and a slight easterly breeze had the targets dancing today along the half-mile stretch as the City of Ottawa Match, the King's Medal and the Michael Faraday Trophy were decided.

RETAIN TROPHY
The biggest gallery of the week went out to the mounds to watch the duel between the Imperial Cadets, representing the Mother Country, and the Canadian Cadets for possession of the Faraday Trophy. The team of eight Canadians, six from the Hamilton Central Collegiate, triumphed with 507 points over 300 and 500 yards and retained the trophy by 10 points.

CONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGES
South March, Ont., Aug. 16.—Lieut. A. J. McCabe, P. T. Hooper and Q. M. S. Goran were well up in the City of Ottawa match shot at 200 and 900 yards today. In the King's Medal match, shot under active service conditions, Lieut. Allan McCreag scored 150. Capt. Coles also placed. Lieut. P. T. Hooper placed 43rd in the Grand Aggregate, only 13 points down from the leading man. Capt. Coles, Q. M. S. Ramsey, and Lieut. Coles placed well up in the scoring.

GRAND AGGREGATE WINNER
Lieut. Martinson, who earned the plaudits of the Empire by his exhibition of marksmanship at Bisley Camp in 1934, was the only one of all his shots into the black in the Ottawa. He did not lead by much however, 15 carding scores of 99 to tie for second place.

PLACEMENT WELL UP
Signalman Gregory's youth carried him through to a complete victory in the King's Medal. More than 100 of Canada's crack army shots took part in the match, using service rifles with open sights, firing from the run to 100 yards, rapid-firing at 300 and snapping at fast-disappearing targets at the same distance.

BASEBALL'S BIG SIX
Buddy Myer assumed command in the American League section of the big six batting race yesterday when he added a point to his average, bringing it up to .350, with two hits in five times up. His rival, Joe Vosmik, failed to hit and dropped back into a tie with Doc Cramer for second in the League and fourth in the sextet, losing four points. Cramer just maintained his .345 average with two blows in five times up. The active National Leaguers, Joe Medwick and Gabby Hartnett, couldn't get a hit between them and lost three points each.

Big Entry List For Yacht Race

Yachting, a sport almost forgotten in these parts, will come back into its own today when 25 white-winged craft from neighboring Provinces and other parts of the Island ply this city's harbor in the first sail-boat races held in several years.

Fourteen boats from Shediac and five from Pictou tonight were cutting across the Northumberland Strait headed for Charlottetown to take part in the competition, while from Summerside and Borden, three craft—Captain James Wright's Agatha, Captain Jack Reid's North Wind and Swan owned by C. W. Ramsay—were expected.

Charlottetown's only yacht, "P. No." owned by Jack King will represent the capital's sailing enthusiasts.

The sailing committee is composed of W. S. Grant, City and L. H. Coffon of Montague.

Light Wind, one of the first yachts entered in today's sailing revival, arrived here yesterday in charge of W. A. Simpson, acting Commodore of the Shediac fleet.

The races will start from Carvel's Wharf, the first race at 2 o'clock and two or three races will be sailed depending on the wind.

Points will be awarded in each race on the usual plan, that is, one point for finishing and one point for each boat that is beaten. The boat coming in first in each race is awarded an extra 1-4 point which will frequently prevent several boats having a tie score.

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
