Minutes of Presbytery.

At Charlottetown, and within Zion Church there, on Tuesday, Nov. 27th, and at 11 o'clock a. m., which place and time, the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met and was constituted. Mr. W. H. Spencer, Moderator, with whom were present Messrs. Sinclair, Adam Gunn, McLeod, Mackenzie, Maclean, Fisher, Craise, W. H. Smith, Robertson, McNeill, Layton and Murdoch, Ministers; and Alex. McLeod, J. A. Lawson, H. McMillan, S. A. Coffin and J. J. McLeod, ruling elders.

After reading correspondence, the following recommendations of the Century Fund Committee were adopted, and earnestly commended to Sessions and congregations.

1. That every session seriously take into consideration the whole question of the spiritual condition of those under their care, and arrange, if possible,

(a) That the last month of the year be set apart as a season, in which special prayer shall be made in the congregation and in the families of the church for the outpouring of the Spirit of God and the deepening of spiritual life throughout the church;

(b) That earnest efforts be made through the pulpits of the church and her other agencies on behalf of the young, with the view of leading them to decision for the service of Christ, and that in such efforts much prominence be given to the case of young men.

2. That God's great goodness to the church and His call to larger and more devoted service, which the Century Fund movement seeks to emphasize, have prominence given to them from every pulpit.

3. That there be held in every congregation on the first Sabbath of 1904 a Communion Service, at which the church throughout the Dominion shall on the threshold of the new century renew its allegiance to its risen Lord. It is felt that this would help to make real its vital unity, and in many ways mark an increase in its spiritual life.

A reply from the sessions of Bloomfield, O'Leary and Brae to the Presbytery's enquiry was read stating that nothing had been done in the way of carrying out the Presbytery's instructions.

Messrs. Fisher and Smith were appointed a committee to draw up the Presbytery's resolutions of sympathy with the family of the late Mr. John Clay in their bereavement and with Rev. Malcolm Campbell in the illness of his family.

The Presbytery then proceeded to consider Sabbath school work when a communication from the Assembly's committee was read containing several suggestions. The report prepared by the committee appointed at last meeting was then taken up and the following recommendations submitted:

Recommendations of Presbytery's Sabbath School Committee:

(1) The formation of a Presbyterial Sabbath School Association.

(2) That the five sub-committees on Church, Life and work be instructed to act as sub-committees under this organization.

(3) That these sub-committees carry out the following recommendations of Synod:

(a) That all Sabbath Schools be visited while in session and as far as possible of Presbytery on the lines suggested in report of last Synod.

(b) That Presbyteries be commended to have Presbyterial conference to deepen the interest of S. S. teachers and Young People's Work in their church, and to stimulate them to carry on their work with greater consecration and efficiency; and that, where found practicable, these conferences may be enlarged into Presbyterial Institutes for the better training of Sabbath School teachers.

(c) That parents and teachers be exhorted more earnest and prayerful effort to bring the young, through the power of the Holy Spirit, to a saving knowledge of the truth, to recognize the obligation of their baptismal vows, and their duty to assume the responsibilities of full membership of the church.

4. That the Sabbath School Association arrange in accordance with Synod's finding in regard to Presbyterial Conference annually.

5. That the organization of new schools when and where necessary, and the re-organization of schools be the special care of these sub-committees.

6. That in accordance with Synod's recommendation (2) sessions be instructed to form at once a Home Department, and to carry out its details by appointing (1) a superintendent of the work, and (2) visitors.

7. That in the study of the lesson no helps be used in the school.

After full discussion it was agreed as follows:—

"In view of the importance of the matter of forming a Sabbath School Association, to defer it for the present, but that the other recommendations be carried out as far as practicable, the Sub-Committees already appointed in conjunction with 'Life and Work,' to report in reference to Sabbath School Work in

our congregations, to the Convener of the Sabbath School Committee.

Messrs. Fisher and Smith presented the following resolutions of sympathy which were adapted and copies ordered to be sent by the Clerk.

"In removing from the roll the name of the late Mr. John Clay, of Summerside, the Presbytery would place on record its appreciation of the sterling character, and cheerful devotion to duty, manifested by him during a long period in the Eldership, and his readiness at all times to whatsoever duties devolved upon him, as a member of the various church courts. It would also express its deep sympathy with the bereaved family, in their sorrow and loss, and commend them to God, and the world of His Grace, praying they may be comforted and kept in His love."

"Having heard of the severe trials through which, in the Providence of God, our Brother Rev. M. Campbell, has been called to pass in the continued infirmity of his only son, and the very serious illness of his wife, Presbytery desires to express its sincerest sympathy with Mr. Campbell, and unites earnestly in the prayer that our Heavenly Father, may in his great mercy, remove the deep sorrow which has overshadowed his home, and that his grace towards Mr. Campbell and his family, may abound into all comfort and consolation in Christ."

It was decided that the next quarterly meeting be held on the first Tuesday of February.

The Presbytery then adjourned to meet at the call of the Moderator of which public intimation was made and this session closed with the benediction.
