NAPIER, N.Z., Oct. 8 - (CP) - Tension has developed in the only kiwi family breeding in captivity. New Zealand's strange wingless bird is becoming rare and a pair at the Hawke's Bay Acclimatization Society's game farm are the only ones producing Kiwi chicks under projected conditions. Now, however, the male bird has a grievance. Male kiwis hatch the eggs and this one has just finished sitting patiently for 77 days to hatch out his third chick. Immediately the female crept into the nest and laid another egg, so her mate has another 77-day task ahead. So far he is tackling his task grimly, sitting on the new egg and keeping the new chick warm against him, but he plainly thinks it is too much of a good thing.
