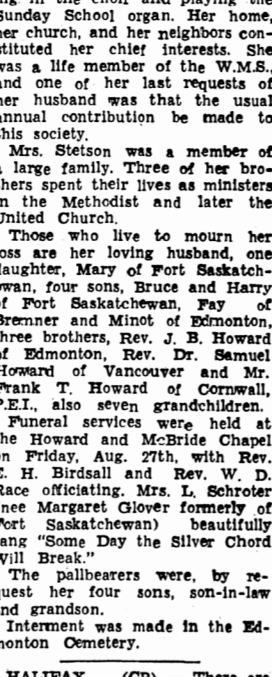

The following obituary is from a recent Fort Saskatchewan exchange:
Fort Saskatchewan and district mourns the passing of one of its old timers, Mrs. Archibald Stetson. She was born in Cornwall P.E.I. where she received her education and established a home, later with her husband and family coming west to Bowden, Alberta, in April of 1906. In 1911 the family moved to Vancouver, but due to a preference for a pastoral life returned to Fort Saskatchewan in 1918 and with the exception of two years in Edmonton remained there ever since.
On April 21st last, the family were privileged to join Mr. and Mrs. Stetson in the celebration of their 51st wedding anniversary. Mrs. Stetson enjoyed the day even though she was then suffering from the ailment which later caused her demise.
She has gladdened the hearts of many with her little gestures of kindness and thoughtfulness. Hers was a life of courage, endurance and devotion to the Most High. Jelly Roll Dessert is delicious and really quite easy to make. Ingredients: two raspberry jelly rolls; one butterscotch pudding mixture; one pint whipped cream; maraschino cherries, chopped walnuts. Line a bowl with wax paper and then line the bowl with thin slices of jelly roll. Fill the bowl with alternate layers of jelly roll and pudding mixture, ending with a layer of jelly roll. Cover with wax paper, then place plate over it and weigh it. Let sit for 12-24 hours in a cool place, or refrigerator, before serving. When ready to serve, remove from mould and ice with whipped cream. Garnish with nuts and cherries.
