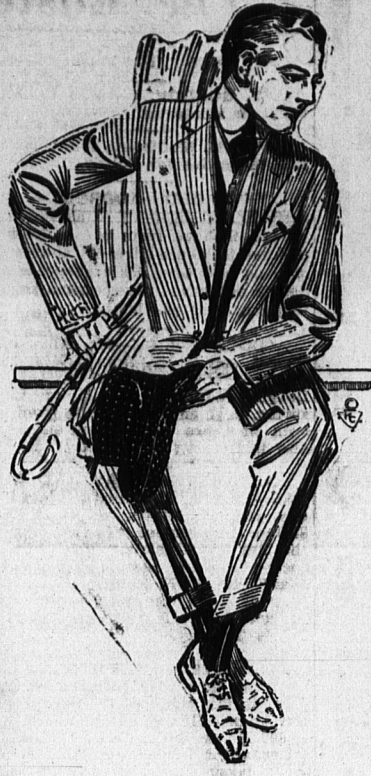

**TEN THOUSAND UNEMPLOYED IN MONTREAL.**

MONTREAL, June 9.—Yesterday's demonstration by 10,000 "out of work" was followed by further demonstrations to-day when the crowd of unemployed paraded to the residences of Controllers Cote and McDonald. Many of the men rode in dump carts, singing the Marseillaise and other airs, and waving British and French flags.

The Board of Control at a special meeting decided to throw open paving contracts which had been pending, amounting to \$200,000, to-day. This makes a total of half-a-million in civic works arranged for in the two days. Serious rioting was threatened, but it is now believed that this has been averted in the provision of work for the men.

**ITALIAN PRINCE ROSPIGHOSI DEAD**

ROME, via Paris, June 9.—The death occurred Sunday of Prince Camillo Rospigliosi, a member of one of the best known aristocratic families in Rome. He was born in 1850.

The Prince had been ill for some time and his death was not unexpected.

Prince Rospigliosi was commander of the Noble Guard at the Vatican, throughout the day in honor. The Prince leaves six sons, five of them now being with the army. Three of his sons married American women. (One of his sons was married to a daughter of the late Alexander McDonald of Cincinnati, and spent several weeks recently in Prince Edward Island. He left last week as previously reported to join his regiment in Italy.)
