REGINA FIGHTS TO EVEN TERMS WITH SYDNEY

Westerners Take Early Lead To Send Allan Cup Series Into Sixth Game

REGINA, April 29—(CP)—Regina Rangers fought back on even terms with Sydney Millionaires in the Allan Cup finals by edging out the Eastern Canada champions 3-2 here tonight in the fifth game of the best-of-five series.

The Canadian Senior Hockey Championship will be decided in the sixth game of the series to be played in Regina Thursday.

Beaten 8-6 and 8-3 in the first two games, Freddie Metcalfe's "Destiny Kids" bounced back to outplay Millionaires and gain a 1-1 tie in the third game. Rangers 5-1 win Saturday and tonight's victory left the teams tied with five points each.

Garth Bush, rookie rearguard, put Regina ahead with the only goal of the first period and the western champions went ahead 3-0 before the halfway mark of the second as Scotty Cameron and Grant Warwick scored goals within two seconds with Mel Snowdon, Sydney captain in the penalty box. Then the Sydney gangling attacks began clicking and Millionaires got two goals in 37 seconds, both from scrambles around the Regina net. Jack Atchison got the first and Grant Hall added the other to end the scoring for the game.

From the start of the third period Millionaires renewed their five-man attacks but Rangers checked viciously and with the good work of Jim Henry in the Regina net, the third period was scoreless although the puck kept bouncing around Rangers' net for almost the full 20 minutes.

The crowd of about 5,000 stood for the entire third period as they cheered the home team.

At Beltsville the average production of non-broody White Leghorns was 194 eggs compared with 153 eggs

for broody pullets of the breed. In the Rhode Island flock non-broody hens averaged 180 eggs.
