Yankees Win World Series Crushing Giants 13-5

Records Fall As American League Bombers Blast Giant Hopes In Last Inning Rally

Associated Press Sports Editor NEW YORK, Oct. 6—(AP)—New York Yankees blasted their way to the baseball heights today with a farewell salvo of base hits that crushed the last lingering hopes of their inter-city rivals, the battle-worn Giants, and tore another whole page out of the record books.

Riddled by the long-range guns of the American League Champions, the Giants finally crumbled under a ninth-inning barrage that produced seven runs and swept the Yankees to a lopsided 13-5 conquest in the sixth and final game of the World series.

As the tumult and the shouting ended for 1936, following as devastating an attack as any ball championship has ever known, the Bronx Bombers emerged with a decisive victory, four games to two, in a series that set a flock of new hitting and scoring records, besides scaling fresh heights for attendance and receipts.

SQUARE ACCOUNTS

The Yankees not only squared accounts with their metropolitan rivals in world series play, with two triumphs for each club in four battles for the game's highest stakes, but registered their fifth championship conquest in eight attempts and their fourth in succession. The Yankees now boast a record of 16 games won out of 18 played.

Four pitchers, led by the hard-luck victim of the third game, fat Fred Fitzsimmons, failed to check the tidal wave of Yankee baseballs this afternoon. The Giants got off in front and finally forced their southpaw foe, Vernon "Goofy" Gomez, to cover in the seventh inning, but it was an uphill battle for them nearly all the way.

Giants, trailing 3-5 after Fitzsimmons had been driven from the box in four innings with a nine-hit five-run assault, lost their chance to regain command in the seventh. They came within one run of tying the score when Dick Bartell doubled and Bill Terry belted a baseball that Joe Dimaggio fumbled for his first misplay of the series.

FAIL TO COME THROUGH

Gomez gave way to Johnny Murphy after Hank Leiber sacrificed and Mel Ott walked but the Giants rushed three pinch-hitters in without being able to produce the tying run. Hitting for Gus Mancuso, Sambo Leslie, fouled weakly to Red Rolfe. Jimmy Ripple, hitting for Burgess Whitehead, walked to fill the bases but Mark Koenig took a third strike with his bat on his shoulder. Dick Coffman, who relieved Clyde Clasteman in the pitcher's box, yielded one run in the eighth and was knocked out in the ninth.

Thirteen Yankees went to bat in the concluding frame, within two of the world series record. The rookie star, Dimaggio, got two of the five baseballs that punctuated the firing of the combined pitching efforts of Coffman and his successor, Harry Gumbert. Gumbert came in with two on, none out, and three runs already in. He finally retired the side after four more tallies.

Three bases on balls, together with an error contributed to the record run-making spurge of the new world champions in their last turn at bat.

RECORDS TOPPLE

All told, at least a dozen world series records were broken or equalled by today's finale. The Yankees displaced a flock of marks for a six-game series in the offensive department. Their aggregate totals of 45 runs and 41 batted in, 65 hits and 49 of the one-base variety, 26 bases on balls and 96 total bases, all established records.

Attendance at the Polo grounds for the sixth game was the smallest of the series, with 38,427 cash customers contributing to gate receipts of \$169,215, but they were big enough to create new six-game re-

records in both departments of calculation.

The total attendance of 302,924 displaced the previous six game mark of 301,430, set in 1923. The aggregate receipts of \$1,204,399, topped the previous six-game mark of \$1,073,794, set last year, and were the second highest in all series history.

The inclusion of the \$100,000 received from radio rights puts the aggregate cash total beyond anything on record. The record "gate" for ticket sales of \$1,207,864 was made in 1926.

Collecting well over \$6,000 per man for their record-smashing exploits, the Yankees put on an impressive finish.

Gomez, although he didn't go the route, gained his second pitching triumph of the series as his mates put the final crusher on their rivals, while Fitzsimmons was charged with his second defeat.

While Lou Gehrig and Bill Dickey got only one hit for their combined efforts, the rest of the lineup gave the Giants' hurlers a brisk massaging.

CONTRIBUTE HITS

Dimaggio, Rolfe, Jake Powell and Tony Lazzeri each contributed three hits to the Yankee total of 17. Canadian George Selkirk's triple and Powell's home run, both in the second, were the only extra-base wallops.

Giants started out briskly with a two-run spurt in the first inning off Gomez. Moore singled, Bartell walked and Terry sacrificed both base-runners. Big Hank Leiber back in centerfield instead of Ripple, was passed to fill the bases. Ott doubled, scoring Moore and Bartell, but Gus Mancuso and Burgess Whitehead both failed in the pinch where a single would have produced two more runs.

Fitzsimmons retired the first five batters. Then Selkirk's triple and Powell's homer tied the score, with two out, in the second. The Yankees forged to the front in the third when Rolfe singled, ran to third on Dimaggio's basehit and scored easily on Gehrig's towering drive to Ott.

With one out in the fourth Powell beat out a hit to deep short and Lazzeri punched the ball past Jackson for another single. Gomez then drove a clean single to left, scoring Powell. Crosetti flied out but Rolfe's base-smash scored Lazzeri and ended Fitz's work for the day.

OTT GETS HOMER

Ott's fifth inning homer whittled the Yankee margin. Twice thereafter, in the critical seventh and again on Moore's circuit clout in the eighth, the Giants pulled up to within one run of their opponents, but that was all.

Clasteman was touched for the sixth and what proved to be the deciding run, in the eighth inning. He passed Dickey, who scored on Tony Lazzeri's basehit.

Dimaggio launched the ninth inning attack against Coffman with a single. Gehrig sent Joe to third with a basehit. Dickey then grounded to Terry and Dimaggio was trapped but the Giants' Manager pulled what looked like a "boner" by throwing to Eddie Mayo at third, instead of the plate. Dimaggio was safe when the substitute backstop, Harry Danning, dropped Mayo's relay.

Selkirk walked to fill the bases, then Powell brought Gehrig and Dickey home with a drive through Bartell's legs. Gumbert replaced Coffman and promptly filled the bases by walking Lazzeri. Johnny Murphy singled, scoring Selkirk and leaving the bases still thickly populated. Crosetti walked, forcing in Powell. Lazzeri scored the sixth run while Rolfe was forcing Crosetti on a hopper to Bartell. Dimaggio's second hit of the inning, a single to left, tallied Murphy.

Gehrig missed a home run by feet on a terrific foul into the right-field stands, then walked to fill the bases again. Dickey fanned and Selkirk hoisted to Ripple.

The Giants couldn't threaten in their half of the match and another world series was history.

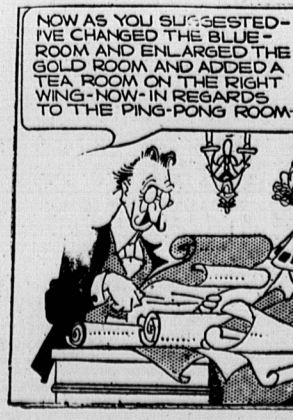

Col. Ruppert And Gang In Jubilant Mood

Associated Press Sports Writer NEW YORK, Oct. 6—(AP)—The hell-bent fury of "Murderers' Row" that exploded the Giants clear out of their world series trenches in the final inning of the final game, increased to a deafening roar as the Yankee maulers blew their vocal gaskets in a wild dressing-room celebration today.

As the Giants wearily stared at the big wall separating the dressing rooms of victors and conquered, the new world's Champions of baseball belted each other around and shouting at the top of their lungs while flashlight bulbs and beer bottles popped a merry refrain.

Manager Joe McCarthy went directly to pitcher Johnny Murphy. "Murphy, I'm proud of you; you were great," congratulated the Yankee boss to the grinning Irishman who held the Giants in check when the going was the toughest. "You won that one for us."

Blubber Malone and Lefty Gomez who raced around like a mad man during the final Yankee rally, yelled for a quartet. Mates tumbled over chairs and bat boxes to join in.

"East side, west side, all around the town," they sang.

Ford Frick, President of the National League, consoled the Giants and then stepped into the Yankee "mad house" to congratulate McCarthy and his men. Following him came Kenesaw Mountain Landis, high commissioner of baseball. Judge Landis stayed only a minute, hurrying out with his fingers plugging his ears.

Then Colonel Jacob Ruppert, owner of the world's Champions, came in. Beaming all over, the old Colonel happily posed with his boys for pictures.

"It's one of my happiest moments," he said between gasps. Manager Bill Terry was the only man in the Giant dressing room who wasn't dejected.

"We had a great chance in that seventh, but everything went against us," he sighed. "I was ready to stick Hubbell in there if we had gone ahead, but we didn't. You can't take anything away from those fellows, though. They sure have got power."
