Monthly Meeting Of Town Council At Summerside

The parking problem on Water Street, dogs running at large and the condition of the former Allen property on Sumner Street were matters discussed at the regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council held last evening. Mayor Arnett presided and all the councillors with the exception of Councillor Driscoll were present.

Mayor Arnett brought up the matter of the Allen property which is now owned by the Post Office Department. He described it as an unsightly place and said that the building had been demolished and was supposed to be cleared up by June 1st of last year. It is the property near the only town park and while he did not know who is responsible no one seemed to be doing anything about it.

Councillor Morrison said that Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M. P. had been spoken to and had promised that something would be done to clean it up.

Mayor Arnett also brought up the matter of the large number of dogs running at large and said that the police should be instructed to enforce the by-laws.

Councillor Wedge brought the matter of a gaily and appropriately decorated cake, in which "Blues" predominated and which had "With good wishes, Blues" on it. Delicious refreshments were served and some interesting and jolly games were played in which everyone participated. Two special guests were present, Rev. A. F. We're really making both ends meet in our two major sports here in Summerside. Tuesday night there is to be a meeting of the Summerside Baseball League to do the preliminary organization work necessary to get the baseball season under way, and on Thursday night a meeting of the Summerside Hockey League will be held to close out the hockey season. The 1947 season has both been particularly successful. In the summer pastime Summerside won Island championships in the Intermediate and Junior divisions, and in hockey we capped the intermediate championship for the first time in nine years.

"Boo" Morrison, second baseman of last year's Summerside All-Stars and Red Sox, has left for Stellarton after a short stay at his home in Summerside. He will try out with the Stellarton senior baseball team. We wish him success, but realize that if he makes the grade and stays in Nova Scotia it will leave a big gap in the keystone position of our All Star ball club. "Boo" was a pretty nifty performer around second, and although not among the leading three hitters as far as averages are concerned, was recognized as the best clutch hitter on the team. With men on bases and runs needed to tie or win a game, Morrison rarely failed to come through.

We think it is only a matter of time before we will be seeing senior baseball in Summerside. With so much attention being paid to the youngsters of late, and the prospect of being able to get each summer some top-notch players from the airport, there doesn't seem to be any reason why we can't graduate into senior ranks in a year or two. If towns on the mainland no larger than ours can sport senior teams we see no reason why Summerside shouldn't be able to do likewise. Looking forward to this, we think it would be wise to have some senior teams from the mainland play in Summerside this summer. This would give us an idea just how far below the higher class we stand. It would also enable our boys to see seniors in action and build up their confidence for tackling the lads in the upper bracket. It would pay dividends from a financial standpoint too, as mainland senior clubs would certainly attract large crowds to our ball park.

The game of tennis has been introduced in the Capitol Bowling Alleys in Summerside. There are ten pins instead of five and the balls are much larger with finger-grips in them. Each pin counts only one and the possible score is 300 as against 460 for five pins. Ernest "Lippy" Gaudet and Ray Durant are tied for the highest score in the new game with 197 each.

Children's Aid Society Concerned Over No Grant

Concern was expressed as to who would interest themselves in the work that the Children's Aid Society is doing if that organization ceased to function, at the regular meeting of the Board of Management of the Children's Aid Society of Prince County held last evening in the Summerside Town Hall. Dr. J. A. McPhee, president, was in the chair.

It was brought to the attention of the meeting that the annual grant from the Provincial Government to the Society had not yet been received and the question arose as to why it had not been forthcoming. It was pointed out that once the Children's Aid Society ceased to function from lack of funds that the general public ceased to bear the moral responsibilities for juvenile delinquency in the community as there would be nobody interested in having these cases brought before the proper authorities.

A number of cases were discussed at the meeting and recommendations made for dealing with them. The truant officer, Mr. Joseph A. Gallant, reported that truancy is well in hand with the exception of three chronic cases and he did not think that this was a large number with an enrollment of over 700.

This meeting was the most largely attended for some time.
