### Another Day Of Silence from Ireland

LONDON, July 30.—Eamonn de Valera is still silent, another day having passed with no word from the Irish Republican leader, and the general supposition is that there will be no new move in peace negotiations pending the expected release of those members of daily Eirreanna who are in jail and summoning of a full meeting of the Republican parliament.

Temporarily peace negotiations have been overshadowed by the extraordinary action of military authorities of Ireland. General Sir Nevill MacCreedy, Major Sir Edward Strickland and others in

defying the Master of Rolls by failing to comply with writs of habeas corpus which he ordered in connection with the sentencing to death of John Egan, and reported spiriting away of Egan from the Limerick jail to unknown place.

### Silesian Note Vigorously Worded

LONDON, July 30.—A controversy between the British and French Governments over Silesia, reached an acute stage and the latest British note, prepared by Earl Curzon, Foreign Minister and endorsed by Imperial Cabinet and handed to the French Government in Paris this morning, is being officially described as a "vigorously worded" document.

### Experts Search for "Elixir of Smiles"

LONDON, July 29.—Cures by mind including psycho-analysis, psycho-therapy, mental suggestion and all the rest, won complete recognition at the British Medical Association conference at Newcastle this week. But experts carefully defined limitations, particularly emphasizing their warnings against dangerous and unqualified practitioners. The theory, taken broadly, was endorsed for the first time by this distinguished circle but it scientifically developed into a search for the elixir of happiness—something that will restore smiles.

"The best kind of mental suggestion is a happy marriage and happy home life," declared one Harley Street specialist.

Accepted as Genuine.

The conference established beyond doubt that the medical profession is taking a keen interest in this controversial question, for old timers recalled that it was not so long ago when any doctor who talked about mental suggestion was in danger of being denounced as a quack and a charlatan. But, according to Dr. Bernard Hellander, who eleven years ago published a sensational book on hypnotism and suggestion, the war brought about a changed attitude, because science practised widely with good results not only on the battle fronts but among home folks in the provinces during the fighting. He said it was now accepted as a genuine treatment.

"One disadvantage," he said, by way of warning, "lies in the improper recognition of the value of these methods. Thousands of lay practitioners have risen who rely on suggestion only and do not treat the body at all, although the mental trouble may be occasioned by something that is wrong with the body that must be dealt with before suggestion can have a chance of success. Many practise psycho-analysis in a way that exaggerates certain instincts which are very dangerous. Moreover, people are led to disclose private affairs, which a qualified doctor might be trusted not to divulge, but a patient has no legal protection if they are divulged to an unscrupulous practitioner."

He insisted that it was an established fact that cases of neurasthenia could be cured by rest and hygienic treatment.

As to "Borderland" Cases.

Geoffrey Rhodes, joint author of "Health and the Mind," urged the medical profession to take steps to educate the public regarding treatment by suggestion, because "borderland" cases should always be under the supervision of properly qualified medical men. He said that unhappiness played an alarming part in the cause for mental diseases, with the next stage melancholia, or an incipient mental disease, and indicated that many cases which were labelled neurasthenia or hysteria were so called merely to avoid the stigma of truth—insanity. He asserted that many persons suffering from strained mind represented "borderland" cases, but they would not admit that theirs were mental cases.

"The ideal sanatorium," he continued, "would be a place where the moral and the ethical side of life was cultivated along with medical treatment."

He declared that the matron of one of the largest hospitals in England told him that the greatest proportion of cures was around Christmas time, when gifts and entertainments had the effect of making the patients forget their ailments. He asserted that the natural tendency of the body was to

### Experts Search for "Elixir of Smiles"

"Our nation is suffering from growing pains. We have not yet adapted our minds to all the machinery that surrounds us. People are slaves to the telephone, the typewriter and so on, until the mind gets strained. If a limb gets strained it can be cured only by rest, and the same is true of the mind. If we could have happier home life we would not have so many patients for the hospitals for the unhappy."

Doctors pointed out that the mental disease called "nerves" was largely an aftermath of the war and said it had been found that a soldier could be cured of shell shock by mind healing. At the same time it was admitted that relatives of slain soldiers had worried themselves into the grave, some having died of wounds self-inflicted and others of unhappiness.

Dr. Helen Boyle, of Brighton, advocated beds in hospitals for unhappy persons and startled some of the more advanced students when she said her suggestion was just as logical as were beds for persons with broken limbs. She even went so far as to suggest that a doctor has authority to separate temporarily husband and wife.

WHITE BURLEY TOBACCO IN CANADA

It is well on in the fourth century since Sir Walter Raleigh introduced tobacco into England and since that time it has grown into world wide popularity. There are now, Mr. H. A. Freeman, Dominion Tobacco specialist, tells us in a bulletin just issued at Ottawa on "White Burley Tobacco in Canada," more than fifty species of the genus "Nicotiana." On the North American continent the tobacco of commercial importance belongs to the special "Nicotiana tobacum."

White Burley discovered in Ohio in 1866 was introduced into Canada some years later and is now grown principally in Essex and Kent counties, but has extended at intervals along the shore counties as far as Prince Edward county. Its growth in quantity varies greatly. In 1911 and 1913, thirteen million pounds of White Burley were grown in Canada. In 1914; 15 and 16 three or four million pounds only. In 1919 fifteen million pounds and in 1920 twenty million pounds. The duty on importations, is responsible for the great increase in the last few years of home produced tobacco.

There are three varieties of White Burley grown in this country, namely, Broadleaf White Burley, that does not grow well on heavy land; Stanley White Bur-

man in his bulletin tells all about its cultivation and preparation for the market.
