

IN MEMORIAM

MR. WATSON W. SEAMAN

Mr. S. A. McDonald received a telegram Saturday announcing the death of Mr. Watson W. Seaman of this city, which took place on that morning in Boston. The late Mr. Seaman had gone to Boston last August for a holiday and to visit friends and relatives in the New England States. On his arrival he had the misfortune to meet with an accident in which his knee was injured. He was at once taken to the City Hospital there and apparently made some progress towards recovery. For the past two months his condition was regarded as serious. About two weeks ago it was found necessary to amputate the injured limb. Since that time he gradually sank until the end came. The late Mr. Seaman was a native of Nova Scotia and removed to this city about ten years ago. He was made caretaker of the Methodist Church a position which he filled faithfully and satisfactorily until his death. His wife predeceased him by about six months. He leaves to mourn three daughters one in the United States, one in Fredericton, N. B., and Miss Pauline, head milliner in the store of Mr. S. A. McDonald, and who went to visit her father some six weeks ago, remaining with him till his death. She will accompany the body home and is expected to arrive in the city this evening. Funeral announcement later.

with work on the Hudson Bay railway and it is planned to continue construction at an early date as possible next year. It has been decided to submit conditions at the port to the careful examination of an outstanding authority on tidal and estuarial conditions affecting harbors. "Canadian National branch lines construction on the basis of a definite three-year programme having proved entirely successful, the method of dealing with necessary railway expansion will be considered, and another three-year programme will be submitted for your consideration. "You will also be asked to approve an agreement with the holders of Grand Trunk Pacific perpetual debentures. "Members of my government have just returned to Canada from attending the meetings of the Imperial Conference. The report of the proceedings of the Conference, together with his recommendations, will be placed before you for consideration. It will I believe, be recognized that the joint labours of the governments represented at the Conference have gone far to settle the relations of the member of the British Commonwealth of nations to one another and to foreign countries, and to ensure a ready appreciation of the full measure of self-government now attained in all that relates to their domestic and external affairs. In the prolonged consideration given to the specific matters of joint concern to ensure the free and effective cooperation in common ends of the governments and peoples in the British Empire. "The recent appointment of a minister plenipotentiary accredited by His Majesty to represent the interests of Canada in the United States marks an important stage in the development of international relations of the dominion. "The Diamond Jubilee of Confederation will be appropriately celebrated during the coming year. I am pleased to inform you that His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales has graciously accepted the invitation of my government to visit Canada, circumstances permitting, in connection with the celebration. My government has also extended an invitation to the Prime Minister of Great Britain; the Prime Minister has accepted the invitation and has expressed the hope that when the time arrives he may find it possible to be present. "Members of the Commons: The estimates of the current fiscal year which have not hitherto been voted by parliament will, as already mentioned be submitted for your approval forthwith. Estimates for the financial year 1927-28 will be submitted for your consideration when parliament re-assembles. "Members of the House of Commons: In inviting your careful consideration of the important matters which will engage your attention I pray that Divine Providence may guide and bless your deliberations."

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U. S. Income Tax Lower (Special to The Guardian) TORONTO, Dec. 11.—The United States income tax, to which level it is suggested that the Canadian tax may be cut, is considerably lower than our own. The same figure is computed at the same rate involved mathematical calculations from which the Canadian taxpayer was freed last year. Across the line they still have surtaxes and also credits on net earned income, and a rather elaborate system of deductions from the gross income. Briefly summarized, the United States income tax provides for a normal tax rate of 1-1/2 per cent on the first \$4,000 of taxable income, 3 per cent on the next \$4,000 and 5 per cent thereafter. The surtax rates range from 1 per cent on the income above \$1,000 up to 20 per cent on \$100,000. Personal exemptions are \$3,500 for married persons, \$1,500 for unmarried, and \$400 for dependents. The exemption of \$3,500 is divisible between husband and wife if separate returns are filed.

Lot 14 ruled outside of jurisdiction. Alberton, Presbyterians get Methodist Church and Presbyterian Manse. West Point, Tryon, Free town and Kensington Presbyterians get Presbyterian Churches. Clyde River Presbyterians get of small debt on it. Brantford and Rose Valley, Mr. Palmer finds it impossible to allocate the church. Mr. Martin allocates Presbyterian Churches to Presbyterians.

Granville, Bradalbane United congregation pays Granville \$800 for share in manse. Marshfield Presbyterians get Presbyterian Church and manse. North Rustico and New Glasgow, no order. Mr. Stewart and Montague Presbyterians get Methodist Church and parsonage. Murray Harbor, Mr. Palmer allocates Methodist Church to Presbyterians. Mr. Martin gives them the Presbyterian Church.
