MOTOR ENGINES.—The shipments of Imperial motors yesterday by Messrs. Bruce Stewart & Co. were one 5-h.p. gasoline to Auckland, New Zealand, one to Iverness, C. B., and a 3-h.p. to Halifax.

ICE BOATS.—On account of the unsettled appearance of the weather the ice-boats did not leave the Caps till noon yesterday and those for Cape Traverse landed about 6.30. The special train with the mails left Cape Traverse at 7 p. m. and arrived in the city about 9.00 p. m. and left again on return about 9.15.

BUSY.—Messrs. Bruce Stewart & Co. are building a large gasoline storage tank for Joseph Bryen, Dingwall, Cape Breton. It will be shipped when navigation opens up. The firm are also repairing the cylinder head of the fan engine of the "Minto." This cylinder was broken when the boat was on her way from Pictou on Thursday.

UNIVERSAL MILITARY TRAINING.—Militia officers here will be interested in the fact that at the annual meeting of the Canadian Artillery Association, which was held in Ottawa last week, H. R. H., the Duke of Connaught recommended that as soon as funds were available the Militia Department should see to it that all arms of the service trained together. At this meeting the Association concurred in the resolution in favour of there being universal military training in Canada, which, the president, Col. Lacey R. Johnson, said was a mild way of saying "compulsory service." At the meeting of the Council subsequently, Lieut. Col. B. R. Armstrong, of St. John, N. B., was elected chairman.

WANTED A PUBLIC HALL.—The citizens of Victoria have awakened to the fact that they are in need of a public hall, the private hall owned by Mr. Calvin Howatt, having in the past proved too small. Accordingly, on Saturday evening, Feb. 28th, a public meeting was held in Mr. Howatt's hall, and was largely attended. Mr. E. Boswell acted chairman, and Mr. C. B. Jelly, secretary. The meeting was a very enthusiastic one from start to finish. A plan was shown by Mr. Charles H. Rogers, which was a work of art. In the discussion which followed it was decided to build a hall with a hip roof, instead of a pitch roof as shown on the plan, and also to make the building larger. A building committee of seven were then appointed, by Messrs. E. Boswell, president; Webster Boulter, Jabez Lea, E. H. Wright, Charles Rogers, Walter M. Lea and Fred W. Snow. The meeting then adjourned, it being decided that the committee would meet again on Tuesday, March 2nd, to report progress in canvassing. At the meeting, Mr. Rogers showed a new plan, which was readily agreed upon. The building to be 75 feet long by 32 feet wide, 16 feet in the post, a hip roof, the rafters being 16 ft. and 10 ft. respectively. The stage will be 20 ft. by 32 ft. raised 4 ft. from floor. The floor will be an elevated one, the rear seat setting on an elevation equal to the platform. There will also be two ante-rooms, connected with double doors, each 10 ft. by 16 ft. The seating capacity will be about three hundred.

Although the weather and roads of the past three days have been unfavorable, yet the committee have been busy and are meeting with generous contributions. The citizens called upon for contributions liberally. Already over twelve hundred dollars have been subscribed.

Webster Howatt, James E. Howatt, Joseph Thompson, Hubert Thompson, Albert Robinson and Joseph Malone.

FOX MEETING.—The first general meeting of the Nova Scotia Fox Company, Limited, was held in the city Wednesday evening. It was shown that the company have now in hand 1515 pairs of foxes, seven pairs of foxes, a number of which are proved breeders. The outlook for the future of this company is very bright, owing to the extremely low capitalization, the total capital of the company being only \$32,000. This would average about \$4,500 a pair. The meeting was an enthusiastic one. The company have already had a number of inquiries for 1913 options, and the incoming board of directors were advised to use their best judgement in disposing of the options. The following officers were then elected by ballot: Messrs. J. A. Webster, Charlottetown; President; S. H. Colwill, New Haven; Vice-President; Allan Rogers, Gambia's Cove; and Findlay McInroy, Riverdale; Directors; S. A. McDonald, Charlottetown, Secretary; Treasurer. It was subsequently decided by the company to offer a small block of stock to the public. Parties buying now will share in 1914 profits. 1524.

now the residence of the Hon. B.F. Pearson.

On this spot Howe first saw the light of day, and from this home he used to walk into the town to attend school. The inscription on the tablet speaks of Howe as "Nova Scotia's leader in obtaining responsible government"—the work that ensures the name of Howe a permanent place in the history of his province! That humble home was Howe's birth place. It was in Government House, across the Arm in the city, that the first printing press in the Province came to an end almost twenty years later.

Another notable tablet is that placed at 173 Grafton street, Halifax, to commemorate the establishment of the first printing press in Canada and the place of publication of the first newspaper in the Dominion.

The tablet bears this inscription—"The site of the first printing press in Canada, established by Bartholomew Green, Jr., 1751; and of John Buehler's press, where the Halifax Gazette, the first newspaper in Canada was published, 1752."
