C. B. Mines Now in Full Operation

(British United Press.) SYDNEY, N. S., Feb. 26.—With the resumption of operations at the Florence Colliery this morning, all mines in the Scotia group will be producing for the first time this year.

The output for the Princess and Florence collieries will be banked, and it is expected these two mines will be given steady employment throughout the winter. No coal will be banked at Jubilee as its output will be disposed of to the Canadian National Railways. It is expected about 100,000 tons of coal will be banked at Sydney Mines before navigation.

NEIL CHARLES MacKINNON.

There passed peacefully away at New Argyle on Monday, Feb. 11th, Neil Charles MacKinnon, son of Charles and Mary Bell MacKinnon at the age of 16 months. Although he had been in failing health for a year yet his death came unexpected to all. Every thing that kind and loving hands could do was done to prolong his life but God seen fit to remove him from his home below to that happy home above where there is no pain or sorrow.

He leaves to mourn a sorrowing father and mother also one brother. The funeral service was conducted at the house and grave by the Rev. C. U. McNevin, Interment being at Canoe Cove Cemetery.

MRS. FLORA GILLIS

Died at Kilmuir, Kings County on Saturday morning, Feb. 2nd, 1924, after a brief illness, Mrs. Flora Gillis, wife of Duncan Gillis in the eighty-first year of her age, and by her death another binding link whose origin dates back to the pioneer days has been severed.

The deceased was born at Brown's Creek (now Heatherdale) in August 1843 and was a daughter of the late Angus McPherson of that place, and here her childhood days were spent until her marriage which took place 55 years ago on Jan. 26th. She was one of the last survivors of that worthy generation who worshipped regularly in the Historic Valleyfield Church, in which her father was an outstanding religious light, honored and respected by all because of his wisdom and pious devotion to all that pertained to the furtherance of God's work. One of her earliest pastors was that sainted servant of God, the late Rev. Alexander Munroe and throughout her life, up to the final summons she loved to recall the religious fervor and sincerity with which he sought to guide the footsteps of his beloved people.

The late Mrs. Gillis was possessed of a rather unassuming disposition, yet, in the neighborhood in which she so long resided was held in the highest esteem and respect. She was ever ready to respond to the usual community demand, particularly in times of sickness or trouble. It was, however, in the home she showed her real self. She was a most devoted wife and mother, and in such capacity was given unusual opportunity to show how completely she could become resigned to the most exacting self-sacrifice in behalf of her family.

Sickness and death visited the home on different occasions calling her loved ones one by one until out of a family of twelve, there remains only five living today. Through this series of sore bereavement she maintained a spirit of cheerfulness, born of a faith in the coming day when she would meet them all face to face. And so throughout her days she has lived a life of usefulness, sacrifice and service for others and having attained to a well ripened age she laid aside the burdens of time and has gone to be at rest.

Besides an aged husband, she leaves to mourn a beloved wife and mother, three sons and two daughters: Donald in the Western States, M. S. and J. A. at home; Catherine R. and Sadie C. in Boston, the former of which arrived home on a brief visit a few days previous to her mother's death and was thus enabled to comfort her in her last days. There are also several brothers and sisters as follows: Alex McPherson of Heatherdale, Ewen McPherson, East Boston; Mrs. Albert Campbell and Miss Margaret of Pigeon Cove, Mass.; Mrs. James McLeod of Butte, Montana; and Mrs. John Beek of Bermuda.

The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. J. A. McLellan of Valleyfield on Monday, Feb. 4th at Kilmuir Church from which the remains were conveyed to Valleyfield cemetery and there laid to rest beside her daughter Mary there to await the Coming of the Lord.

Mr. Tinney also leaves to mourn their loss a widowed mother, who is now very ill in Quincey, Mass., and six brothers and one sister. The six brothers are Stephen, Lemuel, James, Richard, Robert and Benjamin and the sister is Miss Matilda Tinney—all of Quincey, Mass. Three brothers, Frank, Daniel and Joseph predeceased Mr. Wm. Tinney by a number of years, as also did his father by some thirty years.

Mr. Tinney was a man who was very widely and very favorably known. He was a stone-cutter by trade and was a skilled workman. He was born in Milton but for a number of years after his marriage he lived in Quincey, Mass. Later he returned to P. E. Island and made his home at Glen Valley, after a few years residence there he moved to Charlottetown where he carried on the work of his chosen trade. When his health was giving way he came to Fredericton where he has since resided.
