## A MILLION FOR TEMPERANCE.

While yet the shadow from the death of Sir Wilfrid Lawson was dark about them, the temperance workers in England have been gladdened by a magnificent bequest. John Crowle a wealthy Cornishman whose estate totalled £148,000 sterling by his will directed that £250,000, (nearly \$1,250,000) be set aside for temperance work. The money is to form "The John Crowle Band of Hope and Temperance Fund." It is left to the Wesleyan Methodist body, conditional on that body raising a like sum for the same purpose within five years.

But as soon as the Conference has raised £25,000 a like sum from the Crowle fund is to be available for immediate operations, and for each additional £5000 raised by the Conference a like sum from the fund will be available. The object is thus to raise a total sum of \$2,500,000 for the promotion of temperance work, mainly by means of meetings, lectures, essays, music, and ministerial and women workers. So far the work provided for is purely educational, but provision is made for expending not more than \$2500 a year for opposing the grant of liquor licenses to public houses, theatres or music halls. This bequest is justly considered as a great event in the financial history of the temperance reform.

## THE MILITARY REVOLT.

The significance of the stirring reports from Russia lies in the fact that it is a revolt among the military forces, of dangerous and threatening proportions, and believed to be only the premature outcropping of a widespread and general conspiracy. What this may mean in a land where the strongest and surest props to the throne are bayonets we can only guess. Moreover the rigorous press censorship now in force leads naturally to the suspicion that the full gravity of the situation has not been disclosed.

There are now 200,000 men of the Manchurian army detained at Harbin, whom the Government dares not bring home, because of their disaffection. Repeated mutinies in the Black Sea fleet and in the garrison at Cronstadt, with the openly expressed sympathy of the Imperial Guards for the Duma, are also to be read into the report of what has now occurred and is occurring at Sveaborg. "Bayonets think," was a saying of Kossuth, and it is as true of Russia as of Italian bayonets. Evidently the rank and file of the Russian army are thinking along the same lines as their unarmed brothers, and not only thinking but beginning to act. This may be the beginning of the end.

The visiting firemen were very cordially welcomed to the city by their local conferees and by the citizens generally. From the moment of their arrival they have shown a disposition to fraternize with those whom they have met, to see all that is worth seeing in and about the city, to enjoy their holiday to the utmost in friendly, joyous fashion, to have a good time generally and to make the circle of enjoyment as large as may be.

And they have succeeded. Yesterday and the evenings preceding and following it, the city was en fête. The nights have been filled with music and the cares that usually infest the day were laid aside. The current of life in the usual quiet of midsummer in Charlottetown has been sensibly stirred and quickened by the presence of these alert and joyous spirits from the mainland. Today the sports and competitions come off, and they will be doubtless characterised by vigorous efforts and enjoyed with zest, especially by any who have ever "run with the machine."

A few weeks ago it was given out that according to the new directory the population of Winnipeg was over 103,000. The census enumerators however could only find 90,216, and this by including some suburbs recently annexed. This is disappointing to the more ambitious Winnipeggers, but still it shows a gain of some 48,000 since the census of 1901, which is quite creditable. Twelve other towns of Manitoba, two of which have lost population slightly, show an aggregate gain of only 3,191, an average gain all round of about 250 souls for each town. This goes to show that the growth of other towns in the Prairie Province has by no means kept pace with Winnipeg. The towns included in the list referred to are Dauphin, Morden, Carman, Neepawa, Souris, Minnedosa, Gladstone, Manitow, Gretna, Stonewall, Killarney, and Lotboud.

# RETURN TO LAND OF THEIR FATHERS

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 30.—The influx of Jews into Palestine during the last few months has been remarkable.

Some weeks ago about 5,000 Jewish immigrants from Russia and the Balkan States landed at Jaffa. They are settling in the plain of Sharon, round the town of Ramleh and Lydda, and in other Jewish colonies along the sea coast.

A few days ago some Jewish financiers made a trip to the region east of the Jordan, in the direction of Kerak. They saw the land, and were highly satisfied with its fertility and the nature of its soil. They are willing to colonize the district, but are rather suspicious of the neighboring Bedouin tribes, who are averse to any permanent settlement being effected in their midst.

DUBLIN, July 30.—A remarkable scene was witnessed at the last meeting of the Glenties (County Donegal) Board of Guardians lately, when about 600 ratepayers, many of them carrying formidable looking sticks, assembled at the work-house and demanded that the guardians should rescind a resolution; lately made increasing the salaries of some of the officials of the union. The local government board had approved of the raising of the salaries, and a letter was read from them to that effect. Considerable excitement marked the proceedings, and eventually, in spite of the local government board's letters, a resolution rescinding the increase of salaries was unanimously carried, and another, to the effect that any official applying for an increase of salary, should at the same time forward his (or her) resignation.

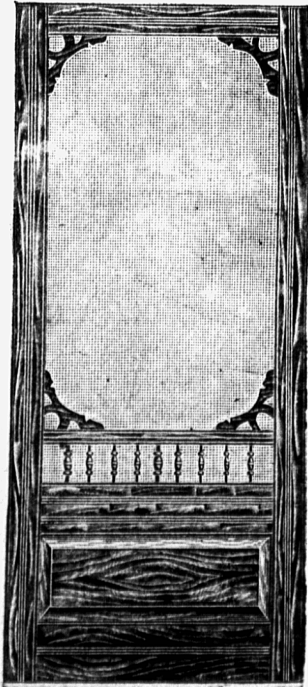
