Public Notice

As measles seem to be getting prevalent in the schools of Charlottetown owing to the neglect of some citizens, public notice is called to the Regulations of the Board of Health, especially to Rules 1 and 6.

Rule 1 states that any householder in whose house occurs a case of measles shall immediately notify the Board of Health, through its Health Officer or secretary, of the same.

Rule 6 states that no member of any household where measles exists shall be permitted to mingle with children in schools, churches, or other public places.

There is a penalty of \$40.00 for failure to obey the rules.

The Board of Health requests all citizens to comply with the regulations at once, and assist in stamping out the disease.

The Murray Harbor and the afternoon trains from the east were on time.

On Sunday morning, December 4th 1910, there passed into the rest of the people of God, at the ripe old age of 87 years, Mrs. Mary McMillan wife of the late John McMillan of Alberry Plains, who predeceased her in 1888. Mrs. McMillan had no relatives on the island beyond her husband and children, she was a native of the province of New Brunswick in the Miramichi district. At the early age of 17 years she married and in due time became the mother of 16 children, 13 of whom lived to grow up. It would be hard to find anywhere a more industrious, chery, kindly hearted person. The majority of wives and mothers would have considered the burden and responsibility of their duties to husband and children more than enough, but she reached out a hand of liberality and kindness to the poor and forlorn and destitute. While she radiated sunshine to all probably none but her children fully realized all that she was as wife, mother and neighbor, nevertheless all classes of the community were glad to meet her always. About seven months ago she went to visit her daughter and son-in-law, Daniel and Mrs. Shaw, New Perth, and almost immediately was stricken down by an attack of jaundice from which she never really rallied. Apart from this there was every reason to believe she might have lasted years for she had a splendid constitution and her active habits and overflowing spirits were in her favor. The Rev. George Orman, Methodist Minister at Vernon River visited her and shortly before her departure they commemorated together the Saviour's dying love and obeyed his command "Do this in remembrance of me" It was a hallowed and gracious time. The last tokens of respect were paid to her on Tuesday, Dec. 6th when a goodly company of relatives and friends gathered. Thomas Richards and his sister led in the singing of some of the grand old hymns. The services at the house and at the burial ground of the English Church at Cherry Valley, where she was laid beside her husband, were conducted by the Rev. George Orman. Five daughters, Mrs. Isaac VanDerstine and Mrs. Brehaut, from Montague, Mrs. Cephas Tweedy, of Vernon River, Mrs. Vickerson, of Carleton Place, Mrs. Daniel Shaw of New Perth, together with four sons were present. The family feel thankful to Daniel and Mrs. Shaw for the attention and care bestowed upon their dear mother but they fully realize that it was a "labor of love and delight." The deceased lady was a true and specimen of thousands of wives and mothers, whose lives of honesty, industry and self-sacrifice contribute heartily to the upbuilding of both the earthly Empire and the Heavenly Kingdom.
