Selective Service Studies Situation Of Hockey Star

OTTAWA, Oct. 20—(CP)—The position of professional hockey players in the Selective Service Program was given renewed study today when officials reviewed the case of Stuart Smith, player for Montreal Canadiens of the National Hockey League, employed in an Ottawa war plant.

Selective Service officials said they were informed Smith left his work as a high-speed machine-tool operator Oct. 1 to report to Canada without giving the required seven days' notice. Yesterday he returned to the plant to work out the seven days' notice period.

Particular concern of Selective Service officials centers on the date on which Smith's contract with the Canadiens was signed. If the contract was made prior to Sept. 1 it constitutes an ordinary legal agreement and can not be interfered with by Selective Service. If it was since that date Smith comes within provisions of the agreement on hockey players reached mutually between Canada and the United States.

Elliot M. Little, Director of National Selective Service, in a formal statement announcing this agreement Sept. 15 said hockey players not subject to military service will be allowed to continue their professional athletic activities unless and until they are requested to engage in some non-military war duty.

Thus Smith, if not protected by his contract, could be asked by Selective Service to continue at his war job as being more essential. Officials, it is understood, have asked Tommy Gorman, Canadiens' manager, to submit the Smith contract for examination.

The Ottawa-Washington agreement does not provide any exemption or postponement from military service but merely allows professional players permits to work as athletes. Some 27 players are reported affected by the agreement but it is not known whether any besides Smith have been engaged in direct war jobs.

Ottawa elects To remain In Q.S.H.L.

Apps admits He will miss Gordie Drillon

ST. CATHARINES, Ont., Oct. 20—(CP)—Syl Apps agrees with Gordie Drillon that they will miss another during the coming National Hockey League season.

For five years Apps and Drillon played centre and right wing, respectively, on Toronto Maple Leafs' first string forward line but were separated recently when Drillon was sold to Montreal Canadiens.

Drillon in an interview at Montreal recently said he undoubtedly would miss his play-making centre but thought that Apps also would miss him.

"I guess he's right at that," said Apps who is here training with the 1942-43 edition of the Leafs. "You can't play with a fellow for five years without getting used to his style, knowing what he's going to do, where he'll be."

Asked how he felt, Apps said he wasn't as fast as Drillon but "he's really tricky. A good hockey player."

Apps was obtained as a right wing replacement after it was announced the Brooklyn team would not operate this season.

Gen. McNaughton's Son Now Reported Killed In Action

LONDON, Oct. 20—(CP)—A newspaper obituary notice announced today that a Requiem Mass for Sqdn. Ldr. Ian G. A. (Bud) McNaughton, 23-year-old son of Lt.-Gen. A.G.L. McNaughton, Commander of the Canadian Army overseas, will be held at the Leatherhead Roman Catholic Church Oct. 23.

Young McNaughton, a member of the R.C.A.F., was listed last June 25 as missing after air operations. He now is reported killed in action.

The young flyer failed to return from a flight June 23. He intended to be a navigation instructor and flew from Canada to Britain to get first-hand experience navigating bombers. He applied for a transfer to operational flying without telling his father and Gen. McNaughton only learned of the action when his son was away on the flight from which he did not return.

DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 20—(CP)—The Detroit Red Wings signed one of their oldest veterans, 27-year-old Modere T. (Mud) Bruneteau, for another season today.

Bruneteau was fourth of last year's squad to place his signature on the 1942-43 contract. It will be the ninth season with the Wings for Bruneteau who came up in 1934 from St. Boniface, Man.

The Red Wing veteran is best remembered for scoring the winning goal that broke up the National Hockey League's longest game on record after 116 minutes and 30 seconds of overtime. The game was between Wings and Montreal Maroons at Montreal in 1936.
