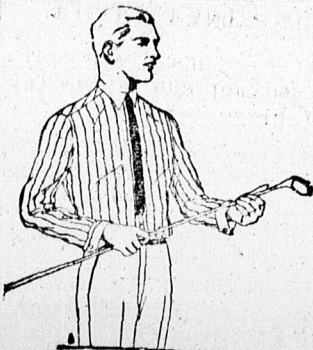

—SERIOUS LOSS BY FIRE.—A sympathizer writes as follows: A very serious loss by fire was sustained on Saturday night, May 12, by Mr. Anthony Mitchell, of Lennox Island, when his barn containing all his farm implements consisting of thrasher complete, disk harrow, gang plough, hay rake, truck and wagon, saws and all the numerous other articles so necessary on a farm, and which had been collected year by year through saving, and the hardest of work, Mr. Mitchell had been away for a few days in Miscouche and Summerside doing basket repair work, and when returning home on Saturday night, rowing over in his dory about 11 p.m., and on seeing the fire he thought as the night was very dark they had made a large bonfire on the shore that would help him see his way across safely, but on landing to his horror he saw it was his barn completely enveloped in flames. Fortunately no animals were injured in the barn. The loss at this season of the year is a very serious one, and as Mr. Anthony Mitchell is well known all over Prince County and the other counties as a man among his neighbors, and the English people here has a splendid reputation as an honest, sober and industrious native and has done a wonderful work in helping to advance farming in the island among the natives on Indian Island. He had tried hard to get on a farm, and in that way was a great help and incentive to the others, as he could show and also help them do their farming. He has a large family to support and this heavy loss is a most discouraging one. The sympathy of the whole community is extended to Mr. Mitchell, and we hope his many friends will remember him, and aid and encourage him in this severe loss. Two of his sons had served overseas in faithful active service. The origin of the fire is unknown.
