MICHAEL JOSEPH DOYLE

The death occurred at his home at North Rustico on March 19th, of Michael Joseph Doyle. A generous contributor to his Church and every community cause he will be greatly missed, but it is in his home the keenest sorrow will be felt. a. S. I. U. crew replaced a C. S. U. crew aboard the Saguenay Terminal freighter Sunrell. Police said C. S. U. pickets were dispersed without difficulty and were persuaded to leave peacefully while preparations went forward for the transfer.

New Developments

Throughout the day there were new strike developments in wide-spreading ports about the world. The 26-man C. S. U. crew of Canadian National Steamships' Canadian Victor joined the strike at an anchorage 14 miles off Calbarien, Cuba. The crew, which took the vessel from Savannah, Ga., to load sugar, voted to join the walkout.

In Brisbane, Australia, the C. S. U. crew of 30 of the Canadian vessel Triburg was sentenced to 14 days imprisonment for disobeying lawful commands to take the ship to sea. The men went on strike nearly two weeks ago.

Both crew and longshoremen quit work on the Canadian freighter Tredale in Wellington, N. Z., although maintenance work continued.

In Capetown, South Africa, 28 members of the crew of the Cambridge were released on their own recognizances on charges of disobedience of lawful commands or combined neglect of duty. Their hearing was set for next Friday.

From Rotterdam, as their vessel was unloaded, part of the crew of the Canadian freighter Dingwall was arrested at the captain's request because of refusal to work the ship.

In New York a spokesman for owners' agent operating the freighter Trieste said the protesting C. S. U. crew members were assured passage and expenses to Montreal, where they signed on. The crew hailed up the gangplank Monday, claiming the captain had called on the S. I. U. for a substitute crew.

The vessel clearing Montreal was the Montreal City, owned by the Montreal Shipping Company. Second ship to reach the port with the opening of navigation, she arrived a week ago with a C. S. U. crew. The men staged a sit-in for several days until forced to leave through means of a court injunction obtained by the owners.

The S. I. U. crew took over quietly early yesterday and the ship left shortly afterward with a cargo of grain for London.

Police patrols along the Montreal waterfront were increased Monday when the C. N. S. Lady Nelson arrived and the company announced that 95 per cent of her 106-man crew had switched allegi-

ance from the C. S. U. to S. I. U. Police kept a close watch on the Mont Alta, first arrival of the season, when she was moved from her arrival shed to load at another.

The Montreal Shipping Company, carried a C.S.U. crew when she reached here in ballast. That crew also staged a sit-in until removed by court injunction.

Late in the day the C.S.U. announced in Montreal that the crew of the freighter Argjohn had joined the strike in Long Beach, Calif.

Dosco Reports Increase In Net Earnings

MONTREAL, April 19 — (CP) — Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation, Ltd., in its first consolidated annual report, today announced net profit of \$4,660,741 equal to \$4.49 on a class B share, for the year ended last Dec. 31.

This compared with a net profit of \$2,299,061 or \$2.16 — on a non-consolidated basis — the previous year.

The report included accounts of the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company, Ltd., and all other wholly-owned subsidiaries, but did not carry those of the Dominion Coal Company, Ltd., nor the Trucon Steel Company, Ltd., which are not wholly-owned by the corporation.

Current assets were \$44,158,353 and current liabilities \$11,854,140 leaving a net working capital of \$32,504,213, against \$28,510,496 in 1947.

After dividend payments of \$1 a share in 1948 — against 50 cents in 1947 — there remained a surplus of \$3,821,658 to carry forward, increasing the profit and loss surplus of \$12,360,106 at the end of 1947 to \$15,982,764 at the end of 1948.

Net additions to properties and plants during 1948 amounted to \$6,046,016.

Other expenditures during the year included retirement of \$228,000 of first mortgage serial bonds of Dominion Steel and Coal; \$165,000 of first mortgage serials of Halifax Shipyards, Ltd.; \$150,000 first mortgage serials of the Canadian Bridge Company, Ltd.; \$149,000 first mortgage 3 1/2 per cent 25-year bonds of Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company, Ltd.; \$32,000 three per cent serial equipment bonds of the Scotia Rolling Stock Company, Ltd., and \$200,000 first mortgage bonds of the Eastern Car Company, Ltd.

The funded debt of the corporation was increased during 1948 by a \$6,000,000 series B four per cent bond issue.

Everybody Raves About Durham Chocolate Cream Pudding. It's easy to make this delicious Chocolate Cream Pudding. RECIPE—Thoroughly mix 1/2 cup sugar, 3 1/2 tablespoons Durham Corn Starch, 1/4 teaspoon salt; slowly stir in 3 cups milk and 1 1/2 ounces cut-up unsweetened chocolate which have been scalded together. Cook over boiling water, stirring constantly, until pudding thickens; cover and cook, stirring occasionally, 8 minutes. Stir into 1 slightly-beaten egg yolk, then cook, stirring constantly, 1 minute. Cool to lukewarm, then stir in 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. Beat 1 egg white until stiff; beat in 1 tablespoon sugar and fold into cooled pudding. Turn into dessert glasses and chill.
