DIED IN PICTOU.—News reached the city yesterday of the death in the hospital at Pictou of Gunner John McDonald, who was taken ill with congestion of the lungs while on his way to Halifax to go on duty at Ives Point. WASHINGTON, February 3.—Perplexing questions of international law may arise from the arrival of the Appam in Hampton Roads. First, the United States must determine whether the ship is a prize of war or whether she has been supplied with any armament which would give her the character of an auxiliary cruiser. The Hague convention provides that a prize may only be brought into a neutral port on account of unseaworthiness, stress of weather or want of fuel or provisions.

It must leave as soon as the circumstances which justify its entry are at an end. If it does not, the neutral power must order it to leave at once. Should it fail to obey, the neutral power must employ that means at its disposal to release it with its officers and crew and to intern the prize crew.
