Important Telegraphic News of the week for Saturday Subscribers.

SUMMERSIDE, June 24—The bicycle races held here today, proved decidedly successful, notwithstanding the poor weather. The senior fifteen mile race, was the chief event, and great interest was manifested throughout its duration.

The first three racers to enter the winning post, in front of Braze Mc Kay & Co's Store, were Charlottetown boys, and their clever work was greatly applauded.

Considering the state of the roads, the time made, one hour, and five minutes, was exceptionally good. Nelson Winchester, came first, second, H. Howatt, third George Brown and fourth S. Phillips of Summerside.

The junior six mile race, was won by E. Grady, of Summerside, in the time of twenty three minutes. A large gathering from Charlottetown was in evidence.

CHATHAM, N. B., June 22.—A pretty wedding ceremony took place this morning at 8.30 o'clock in St. John's church manse, where Rev. J. M. MacLean united in the bonds of matrimony Miss Della B. McDonald, daughter of the late James McDonald of Chatham, and Harold R. Logan, son of George A. Logan, of Gibson. The parties were unattended. The bride wore a beautifully tailored costume of grey with hat to match. Mr. Logan left this morning for Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, where they will spend their honeymoon, and will reside at Gibson. The bride had a large circle of friends here, who wish her every happiness, but regret her departure from Chatham.

SUMMERSIDE, June 21.—Many will be pleased to note the revival of bicycle interest now in progress. This handy machine is in keeping with the rapid pace and keen competition of our day and its re-introduction under improved conditions is a noteworthy sign of the times. Probably it is now here to stay. An evidence of its growing popularity is the keen interest taken in the road race inaugurated by Braze Mc Kay & Co. Ltd., and also in the bicycle events scheduled for Dominion Day. The Driving Park Association is to be commended for adding this feature to its program. No doubt the bicycle races will be the means of attracting many visitors to Summerside. On Dominion Day there will be a half mile and mile race for gold, silver and bronze medals out the event of the day will be the half mile match race between Mayor Prowse, of Charlottetown, and Mayor Saunders, of Summerside, one of the conditions being that neither of the contestants will train.

PARIS, June 23—The report of the parliamentary commission which investigated the naval scandals in France has been turned in. It is a scathing condemnation of the naval administration for the past ten years and it makes an astounding exposure of the deplorable condition of the fleet for which France has spent \$700,000,000 since 1899.

The 350 pages of the report are filled with details of the inefficiency resulting from confusion and red tape conditions that make French naval construction cost twenty-five per cent more than English or German. As an evidence of these methods it is pointed out that cast-iron shells of large calibre, condemned after the accident to the battleship Iena, continued to be manufactured in larger quantities than ever for two whole years. The Patrie, the République and other ships of this class were found equipped with secondary guns of a model of 1885 instead of 1902, as the specifications required. Neither the ammunition nor the guns for the six ships of the Danton type, to be completed in 1911, will be ready before 1914, and France has not a single drydock capable of accommodating these vessels when they are finished.

Perhaps the gravest feature of the exposure is the lack of reserve coal and ammunition supplies at the various ports and arsenals. One officer at the end of a naval battle of six months testified before the commission that hours the ships would be impossible to replenish and would be virtually out of commission. The commission recommends the complete reorganization of the department, the elimination of red tape and the distribution of responsibility. It insists especially upon the creation of a department of construction and equipment entirely separate from the general staff.

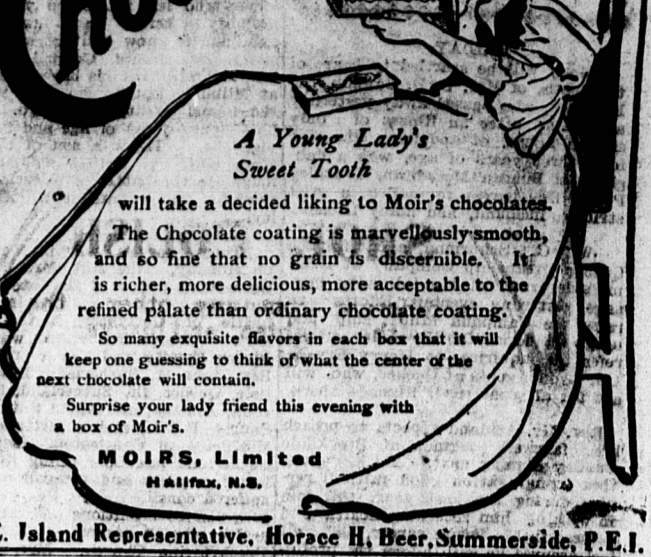
