WOUNDED ISLANDER TELLS OF YPRES FIGHT

The following letter has been received from Samuel Elliott of Winslow who went to the front with the first contingent and who is attached to the Canadian Scottish Regiment the 79 Cameron Highlanders. Pte. Elliott has since been reported wounded. The Lodge referred to is Boyne L. O. L. of this city of which he is a member.

Dear Friend and Brother:— I received your welcome letter the day before yesterday. I was very glad to hear from you and the Brethren. I have been through a good deal and one never knows when he is going to get hit. I was in the bayonet charge at Ypres where we made the Germans run. Bayonet charges are not all fun.

The Regiment I am in is known as the Canadian Scottish so you will see by the papers what we have done. We got great praise for what we did. We are not allowed to give very much news in our letters but if I am spared to return I will give you all the news I have to go on parade now will finish this letter when I come back.

There is a church service tonight at 7 o'clock. I must take it in. It is very often we get the chance. We were in the trenches last Sunday. We were in over two weeks and were glad to get out for a rest. I must thank you for your kindness and trouble in regard to my insurance. I always think of the Lodge when the night comes round and I wish I could drop in and see you all. Remember me to Brethren and friends.
