T. C. BURPEE, Esq., Assistant Engineer of the Intercolonial Railway, accompanied by Superintendent Sharp and Trackmaster Houle inspected the work on the Morell Bridge, the St. Peters Breastwork and the North Wiltshire construction yesterday. Mr. Burpee returns to Moncton to-day.

AN occasional correspondent sends us the following: A bridge lately rebuilt on the Taylor Road, four or five miles east of Summerside gives extreme dissatisfaction to people residing in that section. There is seldom any public money spent on that road and the government should give them a decent job on going about it. The people who condemn the work are within their rights, as it certainly fails to meet the requirements. At each end the approaches are not properly drained allowing the water to run down on the structure and is already washing the clay off into the stream. Then there is probably less than half enough clay on the bridge to make durable work. The rail on one side is about 30 feet too short and some two feet in from the stake at one end. The fact is these small items of public work are taken at about half paying figures, the contractors expecting to make up by cheap material and scamp work. Those who officiously pronounce work good, which is not, are in for most of the blame.
