Many friends on Prince Edward Island learned with much regret of the tragic death of D. J. MacDonald, City Clerk at Glace Bay, who died on Thursday, May 22nd as a result of exposure when he became lost in a swamp at Grand Lake, Catalone. Mr. MacDonald had gone on a fishing trip with Stanley R. Wadden and on returning to their car when leaving the lake, they missed the narrow path which leads through the swamp to the highway. They roamed around the bog for several hours. The body of D. J. MacDonald was found by a train crew not far from the swamp by a S. and L. train crew. His companion was taken to the Glace Bay General Hospital in a precarious condition, but on Sunday 25th recovered sufficiently to tell of the harrowing experiences of himself and his companion. Mr. Wadden said at times they sank up to their shoulders in the bog. Neither had a flash light and it was only with great difficulty they managed to extricate themselves. They tried to make a fire, but their little stock of matches were damp and the absence of dry material made matters worse. The clothes of the two men became saturated with water and

In Memoriam

MR. JOHN FALL - The funeral of John Fall, of Craupaud was held on Sunday, May 4, 1941, from his home, and thence to Craupaud United Church, the services being conducted by his pastor, Rev. Ward MacLean. Music was supplied by the joint choirs of the Craupaud United and Saint John's Anglican Churches. Death came suddenly after months of illness, to Mr. Fall. He was fifty-eight years of age and had spent half his life within the confines of his home, unable to leave his chair. When a young ambitious man of twenty-nine, glorying in his strength, he met with a tragic accident, a falling tree striking him down, forcing upon him the life of a cripple. But this affliction, while rendering him physically inactive, opened up a new world to him, for through his love of reading, his spirit was free to roam through the treasures of literature, his chief delight being in history, travel and biography. "My mind to me a kingdom is," could truly be said of John, and he enjoyed the companionship of many friends, always including the pastors of the local churches. Although unable to attend church services, he had a great interest in its welfare, and was always eager and generous in its support. A few months ago, he was taken into the membership of the United Church, under his pastor, Rev. Ward MacLean. This was but a formal gesture for John had belonged to the universal church of God in spirit for many years, and had rested upon the Father's love and care during the long years of his supreme affliction with its accompanying distress and ill health. He was always cared for tenderly by his brothers and sisters, Charlie and Edward on the home-stead, Mrs. Russel MacDonald, of Carleton, Mrs. Ernest Inman of North Tryon, and Clark, of Craupaud. Miss May Sturdy, of Craupaud, nursed him during the last months of his illness, and Mr. Fall was ever ready to speak of her tenderness and skill; and also of Dr. Boyver, whom he looked upon as physician and friend. The pallbearers were Messrs. Frank MacDonald, Fred Fall, Albert Sturdy, J. Hickox.

Interpreting The War

By Kirke L. Simpson Associated Press Staff Writer The June new moon is already showing over Britain 'onights to stir forebodings of a new rain of terror from the skies. The last July of sustained Nazi night bombing came in the cycle of the May moon. After it waned in mid-May there was a definite lull in German air attack. The new moon, now in its first quarter, will be full over Britain about June 9. There will be many hours which might see a renewal of the curious night battling in the skies to test the British night-fighter skill and the courage and dogged will to carry on of the masses. To offset their dread of the June moon, Britons can turn back to the fact that the May moon which lighted a sustained and furious Nazi port-by-port attack also illuminated the fiercest and largest scale British counter-bombing operations over Germany. That heralded a definite step forward in British efforts. There must be as much dread of the June moon as there is of the bomb-blasted German cities as Hamburg, Bremen and even Berlin as there is in London, the Midlands and in English west coast ports. Even heavier British counter-bombing are to be expected in June than were given in May. Slowly but surely the gap in air power between Britain and her Nazi foe is closing. Some British observers have reasoned that transfer of German units from west to east to participate in the Crete fighting had something to do with the lull in the air attack on Britain from mid-May on.
