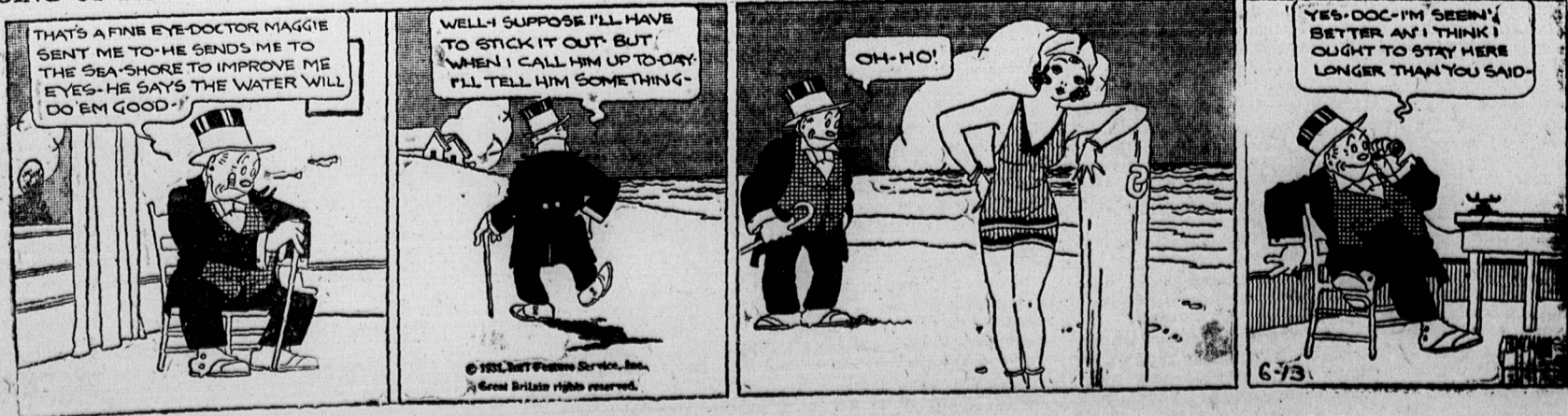
Do you take careful notes of your gardening throughout the season so that you can profit by your own experience next year? If you haven't started notes yet, there is still time to catch up with the season.

COCCIDIOSIS OF POULTRY

Mode of Transmission.—The coccidia by following a certain and definite course may live a parasitic existence upon poultry, and may be transmitted to other non-infected birds to in turn carry on their existence within them. This period of existence in the gut of a fowl, and the intermediate between this and the infection of subsequent fowls is known as the life cycle of the parasite. Each stage is essential to the propagation of the coccidium, just as the adult chicken and the egg are necessary to the propagation of the fowl family. The egglike form of the coccidium is spent outside the fowl, where suitable conditions for their incubation must be obtained, preferably in moist warm soil, and it is through these incubated egg forms that the disease is transmitted from infected to non-infected fowls. The fact should be remembered that the egglike forms are very resistant to unfavourable conditions into which they may be thrown, and they are easily carried about on feed, equipment, or the hands and clothing of the attendant. Source of infection, however, is always the presence of infected stock or seeding of the premises with parasitic forms, from which the disease is transmitted to previously disease-free poultry either direct by cohabitation or indirectly by such agencies as equipment, attendants, visitors, etc.

Symptoms of the Disease.—As intimated the symptoms vary according to the type of infection. Single infection with the type which attacks the ceca (Eimeriatinae) is generally characterized by suddenness of attack, great prostration, bloody discharges, frequently accompanied with high mortality. The disease runs a normal course, will probably have passed through the flock in ten days to two weeks time after which the stock will be immune to future attacks with this particular type of coccidium. Future infection with one or more of the other four species of the parasite may occur concurrently or at a later period.

Another species (Eimeria ascervulina) attacks the first part of the small intestine—the portion immediately follows the gizzard. This infection is not so acute as the aforementioned one, but the long continued catarrhal condition which it creates in the portion of the intestine where major digestion occurs wears down the physical condition of the fowl with a resulting wasting of the body. The subject becomes anemic and suffers from nervous symptoms, including partial or complete paralysis of the legs.

Control of the Disease.—Various drugs have been used in the treatment of affected birds, but the results have been anything but satisfactory. In addition thereto heavy milk feeding, up to 40 per cent of the ration during an acute attack, has had widespread application. It was prescribed on the grounds of creating an acid condition of the gut, but this reasoning is hardly sound because the parasite develops best in the more acid portions of the gut. Milk in small quantity, up to 5 per cent of the ration, is indicated for its high nutritive properties, but the usefulness of large dosage as a medicinal agent has been disproved. Eggs may be readily employed in place of the milk. Care must be taken, however, not to infect the birds by the feeding of raw eggs containing pullorum infection.

Since drugs or food will not prevent infection or arrest the disease satisfactorily. In addition thereto after infection has taken place, attention should be directed towards the prevention of infection. This
