PRES. PHILLIPS LOCKED IN JAIL

Bail increased to \$8,000 and the Magistrate Refuses One of Sureties So Emphatically That the York Loan Company's Ex-President Did Not Again Apply and Phillips Was Taken Away.

TOBAGO, April 2.—Joseph Phillips, ex-president of the York county loan now languishes in a cell in Toronto jail. The evidence reached a highly incriminating stage and finally Magistrate Denison announced that bail must be increased to \$8,000. When a second surety was offered at luncheon, the magistrate refused to accept it, his expression being so emphatic that J. E. Jones did not apply for bail this afternoon. Phillips took luncheon in the detective's office, city hall. His meal was sent back almost untouched. The magistrate's refusal to grant bail was coupled with words: "The farther we get into this matter the worse it looks."

At 1 o'clock Mr. Curry had asked that bail be refused or else increased from the \$5,000 it had been heretofore. The magistrate at once raised it to \$8,000 and declared he would decide this evening whether he would allow it or not. Half an hour later he had decided.

Mr. Curry's request came after George Myers had testified that he was not owner of the printing plant in 1905, and got only one third of the profits. The balance amounting to between \$1,500 and \$1,800, was paid over to Phillips. Mr. Curry then addressed the magistrate, "I will say that no further bail be given Phillips, or else that it be increased. I think the evidence has shown that there was a straight steal."

The magistrate—"There is sufficient evidence for the case to go to trial." "But it would be better to go on and investigate it further here," said the crown attorney.

"The bail hitherto has brought the man here," said his worship.

"Yes, but the evidence is pillage up," returned Mr. Curry.

"There has been a large amount of money involved in the piano company and \$1,500 to \$1,800 in this printing business it has been paid to Phillips and there is no record of it going into the York loan."

"It looks like as if there was a steal of very large sums," continued Mr. Curry. "I would so argue from the evidence and I think there or stealing is the only name to designate the transactions."

V. Robin, secretary treasurer of the York loan, was first called, but he was unable to tell anything about the cheques for \$5,000, \$3,000, \$3,500 and \$1,800, which were drawn on the York loan company's account in the Montreal bank.

The evidence of George Myers, showing the printing business, showed two agreements made by Mr. Phillips, one "for the benefit of the public" and the other the real agreement. From May 1, 1904, to January 1, 1905, the witness ran the printing plant under salary, getting first \$14 a week and then \$16. Under a verbal agreement he was to receive \$10 a week and a third of the profits. Out of this arrangement witness paid Phillips as a trustee of the York Loan from \$1,500 to \$1,800.

According to Robbins, secretary, this had not been paid in. The court adjourned at 5 o'clock. The prisoner was taken into custody by Detective Tweedie and P. C. Campbell. He marched boldly from the
