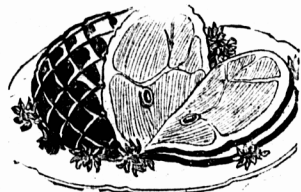

acularly in the last seven years? Or is this law designed to promote "scab" action on the part of Island labor unions? I note that Mr. Wright, Mr. Saville, and Premier Jones are all in favor of such action on the part of unions, though it is to the detriment of labor as a whole, and can only breed dissatisfaction on the part of labor, which in turn can only breed Communism. That's where it gets serious, and if the honorable gentlemen mentioned can not see the truth in what I have said, so much the worse the Island for the next four years.

The law, in providing that all unions must be autonomous, restricts the over-all right to associate, and the more specific right to associate by industry or profession. The right to associate by industry does not mean the right to associate only by province any more than it means the right to associate by community, and it does not mean the right to associate only by city blocks. This right, like all rights, cannot be wrongfully restricted. What is to protect labor, organized in small units of 30 or 40 persons from being subject to the same action by a small or large firm that it was subject to by the government last summer? The Government employed scab labour, and then refused to re-hire some of those union members who were participating in a just strike to obtain a living wage and to seek redress of grievances, a grave transgression against the rights of labour.

I take it that this law was modelled after the Taft-Hartley Act. If it was, I recommend that the sponsor of the act read the T-H Act again. He has missed the point entirely. Even this latter act does not exclude from membership in local unions such leaders as the Presidents of the A.P. of L. the C.I.O., the U.M.W. Each of these holds membership in every union affiliated with the parent organization, and every union has the right to affiliate with the parent organization. It is men like those leaders who can ferret out Communists, (witness John L. Lewis, Walter Reuther, Philip Murray, Green, Mosher). It is men like these who are familiar with the needs and the conditions of labor, and who can help better the condition of labor. As a test of the Act, think what would happen if each Province and each State in the United States were to enact like legislation. How long would it be before labor would be back to where it was fifty years ago?

In limiting the right of labor to collective bargaining, the Government has weakened labor's weapon in the fight to achieve a living wage, and it has weakened the right of labor to petition for the redress of grievances. And by its action last summer the Government intimidated labor from petitioning for redress of grievances

by denying employment to five of six of the strikers.

The Act could be further attacked but I prefer to await the reactions of other Islanders for I believe they are not so stolid as to let this almost dictatorial legislation pass unchallenged.

May I comment on one other piece of legislation that created, surprisingly enough, no stir on the Island whatever. The raising of the election deposit to \$200.00 was certainly not democracy in action. It is ridiculous to think of a province with a population of 90,000 people asking an election deposit of that amount. This move was aimed, without a fraction of a doubt, and I challenge any spokesman of the C.C.F. to deny it, against the C.C.F. It showed the political immaturity of those responsible for the act. Responsible government, to function properly, is dependent on opposition and the C.C.F. is the practical opposition on the Island. I think that if ever there was a dictatorial piece of legislation, that act was it. The one thing a dictator must first accomplish if he is to feel secure is the elimination of all opposition, and though I hardly suspect that Premier Jones is aspiring to the seat of a dictator, I heartily disapprove of his espousing their tactics. It is very bad advertisement for the Island for it shows regressive thinking. Regressive thinking is a sign of a decadent populace. It might be for reasons such as this that P.E.I. is so often overlooked by the Dominion government when it comes time for placing members in ministries and on committees and commissions. Could be.

Sport Echoes from Prince County

Bill Frigen's high-flying Bantams seem to be the class of the Summerside Kinsmen minor hockey teams this year. They are the only local Kinsmen aggregation that scored a win over their Charlottetown rivals, and they certainly did it with plenty to spare, giving the Capital City Bantams an 11 to 2 pasting.

Bill has worked a decided improvement on his squad and deserves a lot of credit. The first game we saw them play this year they were a collection of dyed-in-the-wool puck hogs, but in their game against Charlottetown their passing game had improved remarkably.

For the benefit of Summerside hockey fans who did not see the final game between the Papermakers and All-Stars at Bathurst, we give you here excerpts from an account of the game in the "Gloucester Northern Light," a paper published in Bathurst.

"Despite the mild weather the ice was fast especially in the first period but became heavier and stickier as the game progressed. The lighter Papermakers were without question the faster and better balanced team as their passing plays had the Islanders at a great disadvantage on the large ice surface.

"The work of the two goalies were features of the game as they made many miraculous saves time and time again.

"Steele shared most of the limelight for the visiting crew along with Schurman in goal.

"Papermakers started out with a vicious five-man offensive from the opening bell, taking full advantage of the ice while it lasted, but were foiled at the goal-mouth by the smooth working Schurman, a stylist who seemed to force Papermaker shots to come his way until the rain of rubber finally took its toll.

"There was a couple of outstanding stars on the Islanders too, apart from Steele and Schurman. Outstanding in the series was their big centre man named Deighan, one of the smartest pivot men to play against the locals this year and his fast skating linemate, Gallant."

The curtain will soon come down on the 1948 hockey picture in Summerside, and nobody can say it was an entirely unsuccessful one here.
