HALIFAX, Sept. 27--Lieut.-Governor Fraser died at Guysboro this morning.

Governor Fraser, being in ill health had spent the summer at Guysboro. It was his intention to return to Halifax this week and arrangements had been made to have the Government steamer Lady Laurier go to Guysboro for him.

Yesterday his son telegraphed from Guysboro not to send the steamer. His Honor was then unconscious. Although the arrangements for the funeral are not yet made, it is understood that a state funeral will take place at Government House here and interment be in Pictou, his native place.

The Lady Laurier, which went to sea yesterday, was accompanied by wireless this morning and will proceed to Guysboro to bring the body to Halifax.

His Honor Duncan Cameron Fraser was a son of Alexander Fraser and his wife Ann Chisholm, both of Pictou County, N. S. His grandparents came from Inverness-shire, Scotland. He was born in New Glasgow, October 1, 1845, educated in the public and normal schools, Truro, and taught school for several years. He graduated at Dalhousie University B. A. in 1872.

Mr. Fraser was called to the bar of Nova Scotia in 1873 and was elected Mayor of New Glasgow on two occasions. He was called to the Legislative Council in 1878 and entered the Nova Scotia Government, but resigned from the Council the same year to run for the Assembly. He was again elected to the Council and to the Executive Council in 1888, becoming the Government leader in the Upper House. He resigned to contest Guysborough for the house of Commons at the general election of 1891 and was elected. He was re-elected in 1896 and 1900. He resigned his seat in 1904 and was appointed to the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia.

He was sworn in as Lieut. Governor of the Province on March 27, 1906. He had been at various times a Grand Master of the Free Masons, and was prominently connected with literary and college circles. He held the degree of D. C. L. from Dalhousie, St. Francis Xavier and Kings College and also L. D. from Dalhousie. He was married in 1878 to Bessie, daughter of William Graham, New Glasgow.

The late Governor was reputed a man of high character, and of fine abilities. He excelled as a debater and political campaigner and had a fund of humor and anecdote which made him very popular as a public speaker. In creed he was a Presbyterian.
