Infantry To Guard Trinidad Oilfields

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, Nov. 2-Sir Murchison Fletcher, Governor of this British West Indian Island, announced at a special Legislative session today that a company of Infantry would be stationed in Trinidad oil fields this month to guard against disorders during a Royal Commission inquiry into labor riots in recent months during which several persons were killed.

"The Government, for its part, is determined that there shall be no interference with the freedom of employers and employees to arrange mutual relationships on constitutional lines," Governor Fletcher said. He added that "ill-disposed persons were causing strife."

U. S. Mayoralty Contest Results

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Nov. 2-Floredo Laguardia, the "Little Flower" of Fusion, drew so far ahead in the New York mayoralty race tonight that three hours after the closing of his Democratic opponent, Jeremiah Mahoney, conceded him victory.

When 2100 of the metropolis' 3,910 districts had been tabulated the dynamic Mayor had 683,981 votes to 495,440 for Mahoney.

BOSTON, Nov. 2-Maurice J. Tobin, 36-year-old school committee member, led the instant contest for Boston's \$20,000-a-year job as Mayor. Three other candidates trailed.

Tobin, making his first bid for such an office, had piled up a margin of 8,000 votes over Curley, who has served three times as Mayor and once as Governor, when the ballot counting neared the half-way point.

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 2-Cornelius D. Scully, Pittsburgh's Democrat Mayor, jumped into the lead tonight as returns trickled in from the spirited mayoralty election.

Scully, who succeeded to office upon the resignation of Mayor William N. McNair a year ago, paced Robert N. Waddell, his Republican opponent, by approximately 4-6-3.

Of the city's 412 precincts 147 gave for Mayor; Scully 45,345; Waddell 31,371.

DETROIT, Nov. 2-Patrick H. O'Brien, running for Mayor of Detroit under the banner of the Committee for Industrial Organization, conceded tonight his defeat by Richard W. Reading, City Clerk who had the endorsement of the American Federation of Labor.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Nov. 2-Thomas L. Holling, a fighting Democrat formerly of Wyoming, Ont., was elected Mayor of Buffalo today by a scant margin of 1,427 votes over his Republican opponent, Edwin F. Jaesckle.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 2-Mayor John W. Murphy, Democrat, was re-elected for a fourth successive term today, defeating his Republican rival, George F. Barnes, by more than 14,000 votes.

The unofficial vote was Murphy 36,203; Barnes 21,491.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Nov. 2-Jasper McLevy, Socialist, was re-elected Mayor for a third term today, receiving 28,251 votes to 8,99 for George M. Coughlin, Democrat, and 4,113 for Henry Greenstein, Republican.

LYNN, Mass., Nov. 2-Mayor J. Fred Manning was re-elected to his fifth term today, defeating William J. Sexton, a fireman, 29,078 to 4,622 in today's mayoralty contest. The election was non-partisan.

HARTFORD, Conn., Nov. 2-Mayor Thomas J. Spellacy, Democrat, was re-elected Mayor of Hartford today, defeating former Mayor J. Watson Beach, Republican, by a plurality of 15,859.

The unofficial vote for Spellacy was 31,736; for Beach, 16,347.

The induction of the Rev. A. O. Thomson, D. D., formerly of Ontario took place last evening within the Brookfield Presbyterian Church under the direction of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island. Notwithstanding the fact that the evening was somewhat unpleasant so far as the weather was concerned, the church was filled to capacity.

The Rev. T. Owen Hughes of Montague, newly-appointed Moderator of the Presbytery was in charge and conducted the service in a most dignified and impressive manner. After the opening devotional exercises the Moderator called upon the Rev. Wallace Wadland, B. A., of which he did preach the sermon in Belfast, taking his text Hagai 1:8.

The Moderator then asked the Interim-Moderator of the charge Rev. G. Carlyle Webster of Charlottetown to narrate the steps leading up to the call after which he asked the prescribed questions to the Minister and congregation and then by solemn prayer inducted the Minister-elect into the pastorate of the field after which the right hand of fellowship was extended by the members of the Presbytery.

Rev. Dr. R. Moorhead Legate of Saint James Church, Charlottetown, then gave the charge to the Minister-elect in a most impressive manner speaking of the high office of the ministry as an ambassadorship of the King of Kings.

The Rev. G. Carlyle Webster of Zion Church, Charlottetown then delivered the charge to the congregation pointing out to them their high calling as witnesses for Christ and urging upon all the spirit of loyal and faithful co-operation on the part of all.

The congregation was then dismissed with the benediction by the Rev. A. O. Thomson, Rev. Mr.

Japanese Suffer Reverse In North?

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NANKING, Nov. 3-(Wednesday)-The vanguard of the Japanese offensive on both the Shansi and Honan provincial fronts face isolation and annihilation. Jubilant Chinese despatches reaching here today stated:

Niangtze Pass, gateway to eastern Shansi, was reported recaptured from the Japanese by detachments of the eighth route army who circled the invaders to stage a rear guard attack.

(The Japanese claimed their advancing troops had captured Showang, 37 miles from Taiyuan, provincial capital of Shansi.)

Two eighth army divisions commanded by General Fan Teh-Hui were said to have arrived at Yangkuan, 26 miles west of Niangtze Pass, to reinforce a strong Chinese counter-offensive now in the making.

Oxford County, N. S. Has Champion Cow

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) WOODSTOCK, Ont., Nov. 2 - Oxford County's first 30,000 pound cow has just been reported by the record of production branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture. While several cows bred in Oxford have entered the charmed circle, Hetty Korndyke Konigen, owned by Fred Stock of Tavistock is the first to complete such a record within the county.

At 10 years of age she has given 21,045 pounds of milk and 1,107 pounds of butterfat on three times a day milking.

Her milk record has only once been exceeded in Canada under similar conditions and that was by another Holstein cow, Bessie Korndyke Gerben, owned by the Ontario Reformatory, Guelph, and bred in Oxford County by Arthur E. McKay, Embro.

In butterfat, Hetty Korndyke Konigen replaces the former Canadian champion, Countess Abbecker Hienke, which was owned by J. Walter Jones, Charlottetown, P. E. I., but bred by Samuel Remond of Burgessville.
