Mr Simpson Explains.

NYACK, N. Y. May 15.—The Rev. A. H. Simpson who is at the head of the Christian and Missionary Alliance has just issued a report of the finances of that organization in answer to numerous criticisms which have been made as to the methods of the alliance and the amount expended.

In Dr. Simpson's annual report the sum of money raised last year from contributions is shown to have been \$281,639.54 which is an increase of \$110,084.15 or 72 per cent over the amount raised the previous year. Altogether since the beginning of the Christian alliance work the total receipts have reached the sum of \$1,448,900 of which more than one-half has been raised since four years ago. In closing his report, Dr. Simpson says:

In the first the income was \$5,000 in the second year \$25,000 in the third year about \$75,000 and then it hovered about \$90,000 and \$100,000 for several years until five years ago, it was \$145,000, the next year it was \$147,000 next \$150,000 a trifle less next year and this year \$264,639 so that God has been leading us quietly and steadily and we praise Him to-day for the best year in the financial work of the alliance that He has given us in all these two weeks of years.
