"Hunter's River" Romance Retold
By Bob Davis

The following article by Mr. Bob Davis recently appeared in his "Bob Davis Reveals" column in the New York Sun:

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.—To Miss Jean Gill, legislative librarian for Charlottetown, I am indebted for a first-class column whenever I turn up in this section of Canada.

This year my good provider handed me a small volume, well thumbled and carefully patched, entitled "A Sketch Book" of historical incidents and traditional tales written by J. J. MacKinnon, whose pen was never idle.

"In this book," said Miss Gill, "you will find much memorabilia that has the merit of truth back of it. May I suggest that you read 'Hunter's River' on page 83.

Resorting to condensation, a writer's privilege, I have brought Mr. MacKinnon's tale within the space of a column.

George Truman Sr., son of a British loyalist, killed at the battle of Stony Point July 15, 1779, left a son, George, who succeeded him in the service of the King, and was wounded in the Battle of Cowpens in January, 1781. Recovering he returned to his father's farm, comprising the pleasure grounds at the point where Niagara River runs out of Lake Erie. At this point he settled down until the close of the war in 1783, at which time George Truman Jr., in company with a man named Stanlake, crossed into Canada to join the British children, his sister, by whom he had two children. Mother and infant died, leaving the elder child, a girl named Inez, 13 years of age. Greatly cast down by this calamity, Truman sold his farm and took passage on a trading vessel which landed him on the north shore of Prince Edward Island, 1804.

Here he built a cottage and with tools he had brought, together with seeds, books, meager necessities and a determination to remain in exile until Inez, instructed by her father, was old enough to return to the mainland and civilization. He called his place "Lone Point," located in a dense forest near a gushing spring which, after attaining larger dimensions, became known as Hunter River, still chartered.

The romance now moves swiftly. In 1814 came Jack Seymour, the son of a gentleman in Bristol. Jack would see more of the New World. He landed on Prince Edward Island, found Lone Point cottage, met Inez, fell in love with her and proposed, promising to return and fill her empty heart with happiness. Hunter apparently had vanished, and no more heard of him. He it recorded that a ship of war flying a French flag had captured Fred on his way back to Halifax, taken him to St. Pierre and held him prisoner until peace was concluded, November, 1815.

Thirty-two months is a long interval in previous time, as it is home-coming. Fred Hunter realized as he drew near the land of romance. Contemplate the shock to Inez's first lover when, upon his return to Lone Point, he found, clothed in the robes of a church, a priest who had but a few moments before married Jack and Inez.

With a scream, the bride sprang back as though beholding one returned from the dead. Fred Hunter, but a shadow of his old self, wavered, turned back to the door, relit the latch and walked out into the night, leaving the wedding turned suddenly into a tragedy. A search disclosed no sign of him. Some time in March a party of lumbermen found his body half a dozen miles from Lone Point, his head resting upon a valise, as though he had laid down in a last sleep. He was buried on the spot. Hence Hunter's River.

With her husband Inez and her father returned to England the following spring, the girl lying in a deep melancholy the whole passage. On arriving off Ireland her husband came to inform her that land was in sight, but while he was speaking her spirit fled.

The grave of Fred Hunter has long since disappeared.

DOOR LOCATION NEEDS STUDY

In the designing of small homes the location and number of doors are important since the arc of the swing is wasted area.

Where there are too many doors the owner is likely to be confronted with a serious problem of furniture arrangement. It should also be remembered that the more doors a room contains, the more through traffic it will have.

Wherever possible, doors should be located in corners so they will swing through an arc of only 90 degrees and thus use a minimum of floor area.

When doors leading to rooms between which there is frequent communication are placed diagonally opposite, the location of furniture for greatest use and convenience is made difficult or impossible. The livability of the house is then greatly reduced.

This may be avoided at the time the house is planned by locating doors in adjacent walls and as near the corners as possible, or an arrangement of doors which permit use of one end of the room for circulation purposes.

In October, 1806, a terrible storm swept the north shore. Many ships piled up in the wild breakers. At the point of the storm's greatest intensity, a full-rigged vessel crashed ashore, scattering wreckage and bodies high above the smothering tides. In the midst of the havoc Truman detected a small figure clinging to a part of the vessel, now under water, now aloft, finally piling up on the sands to be rescued by the lone beach comber.

The immigrant, a mere lad of 10 or 12 years, proved to be yet alive, and by the grace of God delivered into strong arms. Truman carried the half-conscious figure to his retreat and there revived him. The boy gave his name as Fred Hunter, Canada bound from North Shields, England.

Here was adventure and drama in the making, the unfolding of romance between Fred Hunter, the castaway, and Inez Truman the island girl. Let us shut our eyes and our ears to the tragic farewell on Hunter's River, George Truman, himself a soldier, left it to the boy, Fred Hunter, tramped weeping through the forest, joined the colors at Halifax, was sent to the front at Niagara, there to be so seriously wounded that news of his death was later reported.

CHRISTIAN FELLOWSHIP

The book "Christ and Money" by Hugh Martin was partly studied with the Pastor leading. One meeting was on "The Individual Responsibility Regarding Alcohol" and one on the life of "Paulie Johnson" and "The Legend of Salt Creek."

Papers were given on "The Work of Henrietta Campbell," "Oliver Jackson" and "Student Missionaries." Meeting closed with hymn and Missionary Prayer.

Five members attended the Missionary Rally held at Cavendish. The different Unions of the Hunter River charge held a picnic meeting at Cavendish, games were played, supper was served, and in the evening all enjoyed a sing-song around the campfire. We held a church supper last fall. Conference and Presbytery fund was paid. The members of the Union collected \$87.30 for aid to British Churches.

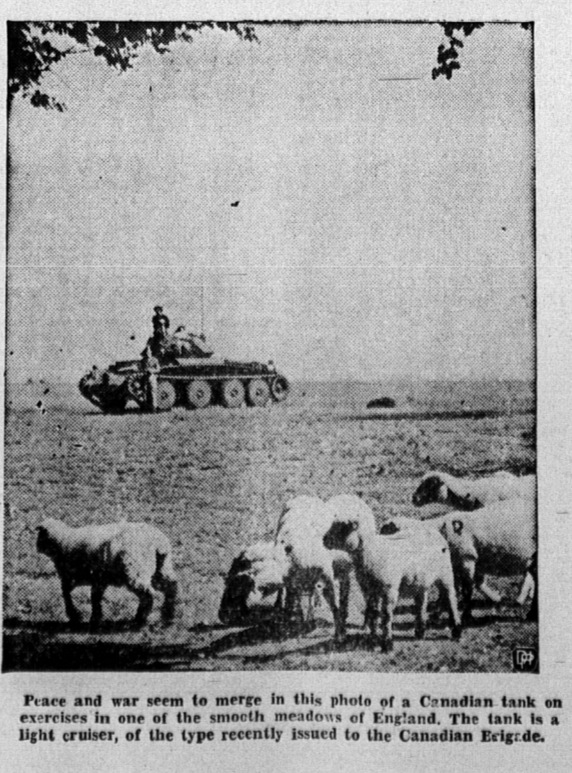
