WAR MENUS

How to Save Wheat, Beef and Bacon for the men at the front. Issued from the Office of the Food Controller for Canada

MENU FOR SATURDAY

- Breakfast: Oatmeal Porridge, War Bread, Sausages, Tea or Coffee. Dinner: Hamburg Steak, Turnips, Suet Pudding. Supper: Tomato Scallop, Preserved Plums, Bran Gems, Tea.

The recipes for Suet Pudding and Tomato Scallop, mentioned above, are as follows:—

- Suet Pudding: 1 cup finely chopped suet, 1/2 cup molasses, 1 cup sour milk, 2 cups graham flour, 1 cup white flour, 1 cup raisins, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon each—Ginger, Clove, Nutmeg, 1 teaspoon cinnamon.

Mix and sift dry ingredients. Add molasses and milk to suet, combine mixtures. Turn into buttered mould, cover and steam three hours.

- Tomato Scallop: 2 cups buttered and seasoned bread crumbs, 1 cup tomatoes cooked and strained.

Put in alternative layers of crumbs and tomatoes with crumbs on top. Put in the oven until brown.

Interesting Letter From An Overseas Soldier

The following is a letter received by Mrs. John A. Hume, from her son Donald, who enlisted with the 105th Batt., and went over to France with the 2nd draft for the 14th Batt. He has been wounded since, but is now back in the firing line. Although he is only 18 years of age, he has seen lots of fighting and knows what is needed to win the war as the following letter shows:

Dec. 7th, 1917. Somewhere in France. Dear Mother: Received your welcome letter and am dropping you a few lines in answer to let you know that I am well and hope this will find you all at-home the same. I have just come out of the line a day or

two ago and will be out for a few days. We have fine weather here now and not very cold, although there has been a little frost. I guess it is pretty cold at home now, have you had any snow yet? What do you think of conscription? I guess it will likely go through and will be a good thing where there are half a dozen men in one family and none of them in the army, and will give a good many others a fair show who would volunteer and are needed more at home. Well mother, I haven't much to write, as it is a hard place to find any news, so I think I will close. Wishing you all a Merry Xmas and a Happy New Year, I will write soon again. From your loving son, DONALD.
