CHURCH BROTHERHOOD FORMED.

At a meeting held in Zion Church lecture hall on Thursday a brotherhood was formed in connection with the church consisting of men and boys of the congregation. The pastor, Rev. G. C. Mr. Flatt of Toronto gave valuable information relative to the brotherhood work in the church which he said was "dormant" in that city. He said that it not only assisted the minister, but helped carry on the social side of church work with telling results. His suggestions were heartily appreciated and the hope was expressed that at the first rally Mr. Flatt would be present and give an address. This organization has been started under favorable auspices, and no doubt it will do splendid work, and will meet with marked success.

REMODELING STORE.

Good progress is being made on the remodeling of the Rogers building at the corner of Queen and Grafton Streets. The work is being well carried out under the supervision of Mr. Charles Cudmore. That portion of the building lately occupied by Mr. J. G. Jamieson, druggist, is at present receiving attention. The new steel ceiling is now in place and the work of remodeling the front of the building is now being started. John Kilonis In Game With The Heavy Ones

BOSTON POST, March 2.—John Kilonis, the "Wrestler with a Thousand Thrills," returns this week to Boston, after a six weeks tour which has extended from coast to coast and from the lakes to the gulf. He went out in an effort to clean up all the inter-sectional middleweight champions so that he could come back primed for a battle for the world's championship, for which he has been aiming and a title which he once held for just 24 hours.

Kilonis, by missing train connections a few weeks ago, got out of the running for the elimination series, which ended the other night with Pinky Gardner overthrowing Waino Ketonen, so that now the Greek finds that he must battle a few times while the champion is picking up the money that will flow into his coffers. The first man that Kilonis will be called on to meet is Otto (Young) Hackenschmidt, whose work against Tony Ajax last Thursday showed that in his weight division he was one of the best men shown here in a long time. He held the clever Californian at events or the entire limit and any man who can do that must have class of the highest order.

Kilonis and Hack will meet Thursday night at the Grand Opera House and will go to the finish, without time limit. The Greek is a relentless and tireless worker, while Hack is not a white giving him when it comes to the bing and take style for which Kilonis is noted. In fact those who know the merits of the men feel that Hack will effectively stop the Greek when it comes to down-right rugged wrestling.

This is because of his tremendous strength and endurance, his long experience both at Graeco-Roman and at catch-as-catch-can style, and the fact that he has proven one of the best men in the world at handling rough opponents, a skill obtained while he toured Europe and this country meeting all comers with circuses and carnivals. The match is at catchweights which will give Hack an advantage of about eight pounds, and the winner will be in line for a match later on with Ajax and the winner of this to meet the titleholder.

It will be remembered that the Kilonis referred to, in the above article, wrestled in Charlottetown some years ago in the Market Hall, defeating Harry Lewis and Bull Montana in straight falls. Montana is now working in motion pictures, with Douglas Fairbanks.

WANDERERS DEFEATED

HEALFAX, March 2.—Three thousand persons tonight saw the Wanderers defeat Dalhousie by a score of 1 to 0, in the City Hockey League series. The ice was covered with water and fast hockey was impossible. The winning goal was scored near the end of the third period.

Sussex Defeated Fredericton Team

FREDERICTON, Mar. 2.—In the first inter-league Hockey game played here this season, the Sussex champions of the Eastern League, won from the Fredericton team of the New Brunswick League by a score of six to one last night. The game was played on a watered ice surface, which became slushy and heavy before the game was finished. The Sussex team started off in the lead in the first period, making three goals in the closing five minutes of that section of the play and then grabbed two more in the second period and added their first counter in the third period when Fredericton got their only goal. Four of the Eastern League's goals were scored by Harry Radcliffe while Friars and Leclair got the other two; Fred McLean got Fredericton's only counter in the final period, Finnegan in the Sussex net turning every other shot aside. C. M. Murray, of St. John, was the referee, and it was a rather tough game to handle, as the players frequently overskated the puck and the spectators were inclined to blame him because the locals couldn't get their combination play working. There were no serious infractions of the rules the worst being trips, and the penalties totalled 20 minutes, of which Sussex players drew 11 minutes and Fredericton the remaining nine minutes.

DISPUTE SETTLED

NEW YORK, March 2.—A compulsory conference called by the resident director as Australia's arbitration court, has settled a strike which seriously affected shipping in that country for more than two months, said cable advices received here today by Mark Sheldon, Australian commissioner. Conditions of the settlement agreement, the cable stated, included abandonment of job control and immediate commissioning of all ships now tied up, pending settlement of working conditions. A policy of uninterrupted continuance of the shipping industry in the future was adopted by owners and employees, both agreeing to settle all disputes by constitutional means.

SOVIETS IN CONTROL

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 2.—Bolshevik troops numbering about 25,000 entered Thessalonica Friday evening. It is said in a despatch received here. For a few hours on Friday there was considerable looting in the city by local communists, it is reported, but late in the day the Soviet Government began to restore order. The Italians, German and Turkish missions in Thessalonica did not leave when the Georgian Government fled, and are still there. The anti-Bolshevik Government proclaimed in Erivan, capital of Armenia, about two weeks ago, has been ousted from control, and the Bolsheviks have re-established a soviet republic. Many members of the anti-Bolshevik regime have been imprisoned and the rest are said to be fleeing.
