SPANISH WOMEN NOT LIKE SPARTAN DAMES

Do Not Want Their Soldiers to go to the War. Surround The Railroad to Prevent Departure of Troops. The War is Very Unpopular.

MADRID, July 25.—(Special)—While the Spanish troops to reinforce the garrison at Melilla were preparing to leave, the families of the soldiers surrounded the railroad station and charged the police with the object of preventing the departure of their relatives.

Other troops were hastily summoned and the mutineers disarmed. MADRID, July 25.—(Special)—King Alfonso has cancelled all engagements on account of the serious situation in the Orient.

Today the first line of the reserves was summoned to the colors. Parliament will be asked to vote further credits so more reinforcements can be sent.

CANADIAN BANK STATEMENT FOR JUNE

OTTAWA, July 21.—The June bank statement shows the chartered banks of Canada as numbering 31, as compared with 32 in May, the reason being the disappearance from the list of the Banque St. Jean. The figures generally show an increase.

TERRIFIC THUNDER CLAP CAUSES WOMAN'S DEATH

MONCTON, N. B., July 21.—Literally frightened to death by a terrific clap of thunder, during the heavy electrical storm shortly before midnight, Mrs. Young, a Bass River, Kent county, woman, passed away in the city hospital in a very sudden manner.

ONE OF ROOSEVELT'S PARTY CHASED BY LION

NAVASHA, British East Africa, July 21.—Leslie A. Farlow, of Nairobi, who accompanied the Roosevelt expedition to the Sotoki country, arrived here Sunday night. He was chased into the town by five lions, the district having been invaded by many of these animals.

WONDERFUL PLAN FOR WRECKED SHIP

NEW YORK, July 21.—The Herald says: A private test before representatives of one of the European governments, Mark O. Anthony, an electrical engineer, last Saturday afternoon succeeded in sending a small dirigible balloon, controlled by wireless electricity, out over the ocean near Sandy Hook, a distance of one mile and a quarter, directing the movement of the craft by manipulation of an ordinary keyboard on the beach.

AMERICAN FISHERMEN CANNOT BUY BAIT

SEATTLE, Wash., July 20.—According to owners of American fishing boats, the recent order for hiding Americans to buy herring bait in British Columbia waters is intended to force Americans to put their ships under the British flag and transfer their business to the Canadian side, as one Boston Company has already done.

MONTREAL MEETS WITH CRITICISM

LONDON, July 21.—Under the heading "Montreal Offends the City" the Mail, in speaking of the refusal of the recent tenders for the Montreal loan of \$3,250,000, says the explanation for the refusal seems to be that the tenders were insufficient to cover the loan, but that that explanation is not regarded by the City as satisfactory.

WOMEN ARE TO BUILD AIRSHIP FOR NATION

LONDON, July 21.—Lady O'Hagan and Mrs. Annie Watt Onyiah, chairwoman and honorary secretary of the Women's Aerial League, have issued the following appeal in the newspapers: "Now that a real interest in the subject of aviation as a means of national defense is beginning to manifest itself throughout the country, it is of the first importance that the movement should be directed along the right lines."

SOME SPLENDID COAL DEPOSITS DISCOVERED

Near Head of McLeod and Pembina Rivers, Property of The Grand Trunk Pacific. The Coal Said to be Superior Anthracite, Mining to Begin at Once.

EDMONTON, July 22.—(Special)—A party of engineers and financial men have left here to inspect the coal deposits controlled by the Pacific Pass Coal Co. a Grand Trunk Pacific enterprise near head of Mc-

Leod and Pembina rivers. The beds are exceptionally rich and steps will be taken to develop them. Machinery is now on the way and the company proposes mining 5,000 tons daily.

The coal is excellent anthracite, better, according to authorities, than the Pennsylvania product. Capitalists interested are making from Montreal and New York.
