

WEATHER MEN MUST DO BETTER WORK.

OTTAWA, Nov. 19.—The first of a series of inquiries into the recent disasters to Canadian shipping on the great lakes will be opened at Kingston on Friday, by Captain G. G. Lindsay, Dominion wreck commissioner. The powers vested in Captain Lindsay are sufficient for the widest investigation and no alternative method of inquiry, by commission or otherwise, has been considered. The first investigation will be to determine the causes of the stranding of the steamer Turret Chief in Lake Superior. The Turret Chief was an English-built vessel. Her crew escaped by wading ashore. Discussing the fact that the wrecked vessels left port despite the showing of storm signals, Captain Lindsay said, "If the Captain stayed in port every time storm signals were displayed, they would soon be replaced by others who would not. If a skipper does not know enough to stay in port when his own weather wisdom tells him a storm is coming, he will not stay for storm signals. These have been blown at different times for months, but what is needed is some one to tell captains when storms are going to be the kind that last week's were."

KILLED EVERY MEMBER OF THE GARRISON.

BROWNSVILLE, Texas, Nov. 18.—Every member of the defending garrison of Federalists was killed before Constitutionalists finally captured Victoria, capital of the Mexican state of Tamaulipas, to-day. This report was made to Constitutional head-quarters at Matamoros to-night by General Gonzales, who commanded the attacking forces. General Gonzales described the battle as one of the bloodiest of the present revolution.

CHAMBER OF DEPUTIES ADOPTS ELECTORAL REFORM BILL.

PARIS, Nov. 18.—The Chamber of Deputies, by a vote of 333 to 225, adopted to-day the Electoral Reform Bill, after restoring in modified form the clause providing for proportional representation, the rejection of which by the Senate changes in the Bill were introduced, notably, a clause that the number of deputies to be elected shall be fixed according to the number of registered electors, and not according to the number of population. This will have the effect of reducing the strength of the chamber from 597 to 520, and will greatly benefit the country districts at the expense of the cities. Although the Bill as voted by the chamber may not be altogether acceptable to the Senate, it is believed that it will prove a basis for a compromise.

PRICES UPWARD OPENING OFF N. A. FISH AND GAME P. A.

The Department of Labour index number of wholesale prices stood at 136.8 for October, 1913, as compared with 136.0 in September, and 135.0 for October last year. Corn, peas, Ontario barley, hay and bran were higher, but wheat, flaxseed, western oats and barley were lower. Cattle and beef were higher, but hogs and hog products continued to decline. All dairy products were higher except cheese. Fresh Canadian fruits and potatoes advanced but imported fruits, beans, onions and canned vegetables were lower. Record prices for jute and the highest price for cotton since 1911 raised the level of textiles. Copper, brass and lead were up, but steel, tin, quicksilver and silver were lower. Brooms were steeply up. Rope and raw rubber declined. In retail prices, meats, eggs, milk and butter were higher, but there was a general decline in potatoes as the crop came on the market. Beans, flour, rolled oats and sugar showed weaker tendencies, while evaporated apples and coal were upward. As above stated, the general effect of the month's changes was to send the level distinctly higher.

ST. JOHN, Nov. 18.—The thirteenth annual meeting of the North American Fish and Game Protective Association opened this afternoon at 2.30 o'clock in the Board of Trade rooms. The first session was to have been held this morning, but the attendance was small and it was decided to postpone the opening until the afternoon so that the delegates coming in on the noon trains might have an opportunity to be present. Among those who were present this morning were the president, Hon. J. D. Hazen; the secretary, E. T. B. Chambers of Quebec; Hon. P. T. McGrath, member of the legislature; council of Newfoundland and Max Mowatt of Campbellton, an authority on salmon fishing, etc.

SELLING LIQUOR TO INDIANS CORNWALL, Nov.—Six months in jail with no option of a fine was the sentence imposed on John Allard for furnishing liquor to two Indians, one only 18 years old.

DAHLIA IS GROWING IN FAVOR

Dahlias, probably the dearest of all fall blossoms to the amateur grower, are increasing in popularity. Every year, the growers say, the dahlia is coming more in demand. Partly because it grows in such a variety of types and partly because it lends itself equally well to garden decorations and cut flower purposes, the amateur suburban horticulturist constantly finds new use for it. As the demand has grown the flower has received increased attention from growers until this season the number of varieties developed reached eight hundred. For a long time the cactus dahlia has been developed to the neglect of the small densely flowered variety of other years.
