MURDERER WILL RECOVER

THREE RIVERS, Que., Dec. 17 - Andrew Day, 41, a native of Milltown, N. B., a cot case in the Normand and Cox Hospital, is detained as a material witness for the adjourned inquest, opened by Coroner Tremblay, last night, into the extermination of his family; eight bodies lie at Rousseau's Morgue, awaiting claim by relatives expected here from St. Catherine's, Ont., and Milltown, N. B., and provincial detectives are at work at the family home, 13 Laurier street, gathering all available information regarding the eight-fold murder of Day's wife and seven sons, which has become the one topic of conversation in a shocked city and neighborhood. Day's recovery is assured, barring complications, but it is very doubtful whether he will be in condition to appear when the coroner's inquest is re-opened on the morning of December 23, as medical men are of the opinion that it will be at least ten days or two weeks before he is able to leave the hospital, where he is now being treated for a slashed throat, self-inflicted at the close of yesterday's tragedy.

S' Side Driving Club Meeting

(Special to the Guardian) SUMMERSIDE, Dec. 18 - A meeting of the Summerside Driving Club was held tonight, Mr. George Callbeck presiding. It was decided to hold a series of winter races on the Driving Park, the schedule of which will be announced after the annual meeting to be held in Mr. F. J. E. Wright's office on Friday, December 27th. In the meantime, Dr. G. W. Church and Mr. G. W. Bell were appointed a committee to wait upon the Government at Charlottetown on Friday morning to see whether it would be possible to obtain the use of a Government tractor or snow plow to keep the track clear.

NEW INVENTION TESTS CHARACTER

(British United Press) BERLIN, Dec. 17 - Germany is showing great interest in machines for testing human capacity in business. The latest is one constructed by Professor Henning of Densig, who claims that it tests honesty automatically. Two applicants for a post are given index cards which they are told to place in drawers and subsequently to remove, in the absence of the examiners. Apparently there is no check on the work done. When the examiners come back they ask the aspirants how many cards they have indexed. The deceitful man, the professor seems to think, will declare that he put many more cards away than he actually did. Since, though, every card placed in the index is registered by electricity in another room, dishonesty would be quickly found out. Another test apparatus consists of a revolving disc containing small holes. One of the candidates is given red marbles, the other green. Both are attempted to place the marbles in the holes as quickly as possible. The examiners walk away giving the candidates plenty of opportunity of stealing each other's marbles or of otherwise cheating. Every move, however is registered automatically. The professor also claims that he has succeeded in working out a mechanical system to detect patience, fear, presence of mind, curiosity, foolishness and other qualities and defects.

Plane Cracks Up, Airmen Killed

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Dec. 18 - Announcement that two British Royal Air Force aviators were killed in a crash of their plane in Tunis while attempting a non stop flight to Capetown, was made by Lord Thomson, Air Minister late tonight. The men were Squadron Leader A. James Williams and Flight Lieut. A. Jenkins, who left Cranwell airbase in Lincolnshire yesterday morning and had barely reached the African coast when their monoplane cracked up.

IN THE POLICE COURT

THEFT OF GESE - A very exceptionally mean theft was committed a few nights ago on the premises of Mr. Marvin Clark, Lot 18. Mr. Clark is a bit of a naturalist and, like Jack Miner is an enthusiast in the conservation of Canada's migratory wildfowl. His place is on an arm of the bay and he has established a bird sanctuary there, where several wild black ducks are induced to stay the winter and where he feeds them and the passing wild geese every spring and fall. He has a flock of about 80 domesticated wild geese, which are all licensed by the Department of the Interior, Ottawa. Meanwhile other points were reporting wires down through the heavy burden of sleet which covered them. From Ontario cities and towns came a growing report of minor accidents caused by automobiles skidding. Harassed wire chiefs in the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Telegraph Companies operating rooms, were faced with a heavy task, as they sought to effect communication with many Ontario points. Wires to Woodstock, Chatham, Galt, St. Thomas and other western points, were reported out of commission and many other places were not reached.

Two and half inches of sleet snow fell here yesterday and last night, brought the December snow fall to date close to the December average for the whole month, which is 13 inches.

come of Premier J. E. Brown's argument at Ottawa that the Dominion government undertake a building program to provide work in western cities this winter. "Conditions are worse in Calgary," he said. "Apparently the Dominion government does not understand the conditions prevailing in western Canada today," remarked Mayor Dan McLean, of Winnipeg, following Mr. Heenan's statement. Premier John Bracken, of Manitoba, refused comment on the report from the capital. Considered the key to the employment status of the west, Winnipeg's situation was characterized today as the worst in seven years. At the employment service bureau nearly 1200 men are recorded as seeking work in comparison to less than 750 at the same time last year. The totals have been gradually mounting and are expected to take a sudden surge forward when the extra staff carried by department stores for the "Xmas rush" are released.

MOSHER TAKES ISSUE WITH HEENAN'S STATEMENT

OTTAWA, Dec. 18 - Urging that steps be taken to head off depression instead of waiting until conditions become desperate, A. R. Mosher, President of the Canadian Congress of Labor and the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees issued a statement today reiterating his recent plea for a Federal conference on unemployment. He takes issue in today's statement with the statement issued by Hon. Peter Heenan, Minister of Labor, in respect to employment. Mr. Mosher refers to the claims coming from the West that the unemployment situation in Western Canada, is the worst in six or seven years.
