The funeral of the late Charles Bridges, City, took place yesterday from his late residence, corner of Dorchester and Weymouth Streets, to Bunbury Cemetery, where interment was made.

Yesterday morning at Notre Dame Academy, Joseph Brennan, of Pictou, N. S., and Miss Bertha Lawlor, of this city, were married by Rev. Dr. McLellan. The happy couple left on a wedding trip to America and other cities.

The program of moving pictures at the Bijou last night were splendid and the patrons of the house were genuinely interested in them. The illustrated song, which was sung in the singers usual good style, was excellent and received much deserved applause.

Large shipments of potatoes are arriving from Prince Edward Island. This morning the schooner Arrostock had 1500 bushels of potatoes, 1500 bushels of oats and 300 bushels of turnips. The schooner Three Bells arrived in port with 4100 bushels of potatoes, 460 bushels of oats and 750 bushels of carrots.—Halifax Echo.

At the Police Court yesterday James McKenna, charged with being drunk was fined two dollars. Mr Coombs having been appointed manager of the Bank of Montreal in that City. Russell in a few remarks, in which he referred to the efficient manner in which Mr Coombs had filled the position which he had held in the town for the past ten years, proposed a toast to the guests of the evening. Mr Coombs replied in a feeling manner. Mayor E. R. McDonald, Senator Poirier, Fred Robidoux and O. M. Melanson also spoke a few words complimentary of Mr Coombs in his official capacity. A toast was also proposed to the host and hostess of the evening, to which Mr Melanson responded in his usual genial style.
