SUPREME COURT PROCEEDINGS.—In the Supreme Court on Wednesday His Lordship Chief Justice Sullivan delivered judgment in the case brought by Francis Collins against George Keenan which was tried before His Lordship and a jury on Friday. This action arose out of an assault which took place on board the steamer Earl Grey at Pictou, N. S., in March last, when Keenan assaulted Collins with a shovel. Considerable evidence had been given, including that of the Captain, the first mate and other employees of the Earl Grey, who were all examined on behalf of the defendant. The defence was that the assault was committed in self-defence; but the plaintiff argued that even if it was in self defence the assault was unjustified and severe. On the conclusion of the hearing on Friday last, His Lordship reserved judgment until Wednesday, when he found for the plaintiff, fixing the damages at \$40. He stated that had there not been some provocation on the part of the plaintiff—which, however, did not justify the defendant's conduct—the damages would have been higher. The Hon. W. E. Stewart, K. C., appeared for the plaintiff and Messrs A. McDonald, K. C., James D. Stewart, of Georgetown, for the defendant. The Court is still in session.

THE DETECTIVES.—It is understood that Messrs Elrod and Valade, the detectives who have given evidence for the prosecution in the prohibition cases at the City Police Court on Thursday, returned from Summerside on Wednesday afternoon and went to one of the hotels (in which they had been staying for a while) and, having had their supper, settled their bills and left by the night train for Georgetown. It seems therefore, that it was their intention to abandon the cases in which they were concerned.

PHARMACEUTICAL EXAMS.

Yesterday the semi-annual examinations of the P. E. I. Pharmaceutical Association were commenced in the Y. M. C. A. rooms at Charlottetown and will likely be concluded today. The candidates under examination are Messrs. Chas. McLaughlin, Summerside, Ernest Worth of the McKinnon Drug Store and Peter McDonald of the Two Maas. The examiners are Messrs. J. G. Jamieson, and E. A. Foster, Charlottetown, and T. E. Dalton, Summerside. The result of the examination will probably be published tomorrow.

"THE BLACK FOXES."—In lieu of the gold mine that has been discovered in the Island—the black fox industry—the New Glasgow Cubs, professional hockey players, have changed their name to Black Foxes, most appropriate as a number of their men are Islanders. In the game with the Socials Wednesday night both teams showed bad temper and fowl play on the ice. The New Glasgow Chronicle says of the game: "Perhaps it was the adoption of the new name, or it may have been from other causes, but the Black Foxes signalled their appearance under the fur name with one of the finest exhibitions of bad temper and disgraceful tactics they could present. The Black Foxes were not all to blame. It takes two to make a quarrel and the fighting members of the Socials were not to be outdone when it came to scrapping." It has been claimed by the Socials that it was Mike Murphy, brother of the Judge that shouted the insults, but he claims that he did not hear Mike Murphy shouting at all, and did not know where he was standing in the rink. The explanation from "Greg" seems pretty clear and substantial.
