Dr. Manion stood for as leader of the rejuvenated National Conservative Party. The speaker then reviewed trenchantly the achievements of the great Empire Conference of 1932, which resulted in the signing of the Empire Trade Agreements. He was particularly effective in scoring the failure of previous Liberal governments to effect this result, and the bitter opposition of Mr. King and his followers to the passing of the treaties. What ranked in Mr. King's mind was that "Bennett had persuaded that conference to give Canada what it had been the dream of every Prime Minister since Confederation to achieve—a preference in the markets of Great Britain."

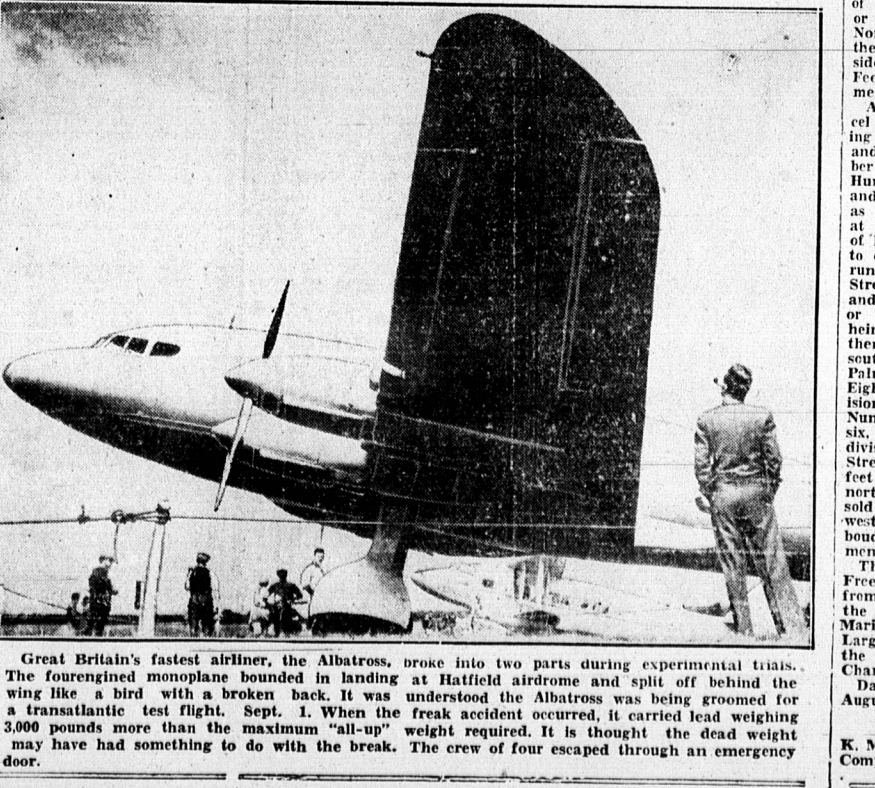
