DAIRY COURSES OPEN—The Dairy Courses here opened Tuesday at the Agricultural School with practical work in cheese making conducted by Mr. Morrow and milk testing conducted by Mr. C. J. Cook of Kensington. In the afternoon a discussion of practical phrases of cheese making was taken up by the classes. Mr. W. J. Reid of the Department of Agriculture and Mr. Vernon Crockett, principal of Agricultural School gave addresses of welcome to the students and briefly outlined the nature of the work that would be taken up later. On Wednesday morning the practical work of cheese making and milk testing was continued. In the afternoon Mr. Crockett gave an address on Mathematics. This morning Mr. W. J. Reid will give an address on the feeding of Dairy cows, after which the classes will visit the Experimental Farm for the special purposes of seeing the herd of Dairy cows and noting the system of feeding followed there. In the afternoon the classes will visit the Horse Show. During the course lectures will be given in stock feeding, motor mechanics, mathematics to the cheese and butter makers, and on other subjects of importance.

CURRAN BAN BRIDGE RACES—There were two exceptionally good races held on Saturday, March 12th at Curran Ban Bridge. The races included a Free for All trot and a match race. The Free for All was called first when seven fast horses faced the starter in the Court who handled that part in a very creditable manner. In the third heat Whizbang made a bad break on account of the bad ice and lagged in losing the heat. The fourth heat easily decided him the winner and was pronounced by all as the best race seen for some time.
