Zion Presbyterian Church Celebrates 89th Anniversary

The eighty-ninth anniversary of the congregation of Zion Presbyterian Church this city will be observed on Sunday, July 24th when appropriate services will be held.

The history of the congregation dates back to 1860, and the present church building was opened in 1913. Mr. Donald MacKinnon, K.C. was an elder and a member of the choir at that time, is still active in the work of the session, where he has served as clerk for a number of years. Mr. MacKinnon, a member of the choir, continues to make his contribution to the service of praise.

The late Rev. George C. Taylor was the minister of the church when the congregation moved into the new building. The present minister, the Rev. G. Carlyle Webster, has served the congregation since 1931.

The guest speaker at both services for the anniversary celebrations will be the Rev. E. Melville Aitken, B.A., B.D., a native of Charlottetown. P. E. I. he is a graduate of Prince of Wales College, of Dalhousie University and of Pine Hill Divinity Hall. He is a veteran of the First World War, having served with the Artillery.

At the age of thirty-one he accepted a call to St. Andrew's United Church, Sydney, Nova Scotia, one of the leading churches in the Maritime Province. Under his leadership hundreds of new members were received, and there was a steady growth in all departments.

In 1935 he heard the call of the West and went to Calgary to become minister of the Central United Church in that city, the most strategic church in the West, Winnipeg and the Coast. There for several years he carried on a far-reaching ministry, and became widely known as a radio preacher, having built up a very large radio congregation over a vast area of Western Canada, that has continued to grow steadily. During this period the congregation almost doubled its membership, reaching about two thousand members.

In 1942 he accepted a call to First United Church in Hamilton, Ontario, to become minister of one of the largest and leading churches in the United Church of Canada. In the past seven years he received into the church about fourteen hundred new members, the majority on profession of faith. The church now has a membership of over twenty-five hundred, and the gifts have almost doubled in the same period of time. In Hamilton, as in Calgary, he has a large radio congregation.

Mr. Aitken is Chairman of Presbytery, Chairman of the Missionary and Maintenance Committee of the Hamilton Conference and Chairman of the Overseas Mission Board of the United Church of Canada.

It is expected there will be a large congregation at Zion Church, both morning and evening, of those who wish to avail themselves of the privilege of hearing Mr. Aitken.

The music of the day will be under the direction of Mr. Frank Johnson, A.T.C.L. organist and choir director. Suitable anthems and special music will be rendered at both services.

Among The Farmers Federation Of Agriculture News

Butter Situation. A review of the butter situation in the Canada in the last couple of overall picture. Although a couple of creamery salesmen broke away from our mutual agreement on the wholesale price of point butter and disposed of a small quantity which threatened to undermine the whole domestic price structure, things are again being used to replace the instance where a marketing board with definite authority to regulate marketing under such conditions, could protect the interests of the producer.

No. 1 butter is moving freely into storage and from contracts as far as they would make any statement but should be some assurance to the butter trade. With the decrease in production across Canada in the last couple of weeks, it does not look as though there will be any serious surplus of butter during this coming winter.

A release from the Dominion Bureau of Statistics shows where the production of margarine has increased materially for the first five months of 1949. On the other hand, the total creamery butter consumption for the same period up to June last is only down 21.4 per cent from last year. It would appear that the large percentage of the margarine purchased by consumers is being used to replace other fats and oils in cooking, baking, etc., rather than as a substitute for butter.

Cheese. Representatives from the cheese factories in the province held a meeting of their kind on Monday evening and agreed on plans for the orderly marketing of this year's production. Present indications are that our fifty million pound Canadian Cheese Contract may be filled early in August. The bulk of the cheese in storage has been disposed of to American markets during recent weeks. So there is a variation of opinion as to the outlook for this year's production. Your cheese board is watching developments very closely.

Potatoes. At a meeting of the Potato Promotion Committee yesterday afternoon, the majority of island dealers have agreed on the use of one uniform brand or design on the bags for all potatoes shipped from the island and should be a big boon to the industry. The need of a uniform brand emphasizing, Prince Edward Island quality produce, should definitely be an advantage when placed before consumers. Perhaps later on we may be able to agree on a general Prince Edward Island brand for all potatoes.

Marketing Meeting. Our provincial series of marketing meetings will commence in Western Prince the week of August 1st. These meetings will be held throughout the province at our main shipping points during August and September, and will give farmers an opportunity of becoming acquainted with the many post-war marketing problems. The setup of our farm organizations, the Central Co-operative marketing plan, and general potato conditions will also be reviewed.

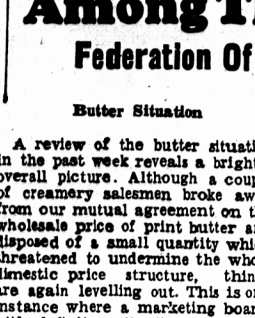

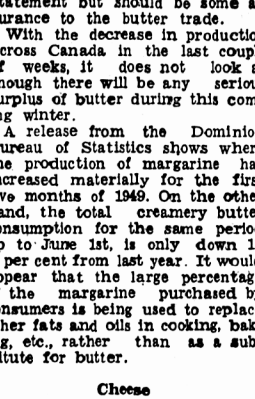
