ROOSEVELT'S PEACE APPEAL SAID 'ABSURD'

Duce Cites Plans For World Exposition In 1942 As Peace Gesture.

ROME, April 20—(AP)—Premier Mussolini today cited plans for a World Exposition in Rome in 1942 as proof that Italy expected at least three years of peace but declared President Roosevelt's proposal for 10-year non-aggression guarantees was "absurd."

"If we were cherishing obscure aggressive designs, we would not be dedicating ourselves... to work of such vast proportions," Duce told directors of the Exposition assembled to report on their progress.

Mussolini used one sentence to pose the uncertainty of a reply to President Roosevelt's appeal of last Saturday and to emphasize the policy of the Rome-Berlin Axis as one of peace.

"Whether or not my reply is sent to the well-known message," he said, "I cannot pass up this opportunity to reason that the policy of Rome and of the Axis is a policy inspired by the criterion of peace and of collaboration, of which Germany and Italy have given many concrete proofs."

Mentions No Name

Nowhere in the speech, which was delivered in Julius Caesar Hall, of the capital and broadcast, did he mention the name of Roosevelt. He mentioned the name of Italy only in the well-known message and, at another point, to "Messiah-like messengers."

But after citing the 1942 exposition plans as "a promising indication that we do not intend to attack anyone," Duce declared: "It is therefore absolutely unjust and unjustifiable from any point of view to attempt to place nations of the Axis on the seat of the accused."

BUSY PROGRAM FOR ROYALTY AT OTTAWA

State, Ceremonial and Military Pageantry Will Mark Four-Day Visit.

(By The Canadian Press)

OTTAWA, April 20—The four-day program of state ceremonies and military pageantry scheduled for Ottawa next month will provide the King and Queen with a broad cross-section view of the country's varied population.

Detailed plans announced today by the Dominion Government's Inter-Departmental Committee in charge of arrangements for the royal tour provide for presentation to Their Majesties not only dignitaries of state and diplomatic corps, but for representatives of the government services and other officials, veterans' organizations, law-enforcement agencies.

Their Majesties, from their arrival at 11 a.m. May 17 until their departure for Kingston, Ont., on the evening of May 20, will have a crowded program with little time for rest.

Highlight of Visit

Highlight of the visit of the King and Queen to the capital will be the unveiling of the National War Memorial in Confederation Square May 18. His Majesty's address to the thousands gathered about the massive granite pile in the city's main square will be broadcast to all Canada and the United States.

Secondary features of the capital program include laying of the cornerstone of the new Supreme Court building by Her Majesty, Trooping of the Color by the King, a state dinner, dinner for members of the Senate and Commons, a birthday garden party for His Majesty and a state ceremony where the King will either give royal assent to a number of bills or prorogue parliament.

Cannon crashing out a royal salute will herald the arrival of the royal train from Montreal on May 17, an hour before noon. Prime Minister Mackenzie King will descend from the train with Their Majesties, who will be welcomed to the capital by their hosts, Governor-General and Lady Tweedsmuir.

Also on the special platform beside the railway tracks on the outskirts of the city will be cabinet members, senators and House of Commons members, from the Ottawa area and speakers of both houses.

A guard of honor and band will present a royal salute after which the King will inspect the guard of honor and enter an automobile with the Queen and an equestrian drive through the city to Government House, royal headquarters for the stay in the capital.

Their Majesties have a free afternoon for rest in preparation for the state dinner and Trooping of the Colors. The King will be granted audiences by the King the following morning, followed by a reception for press representatives accompanying Their Majesties.

The King and Queen will lunch privately with Lord and Lady Tweedsmuir at Government House.

Memorial Unveiling

On the afternoon of May 18 a mounted escort will accompany Their Majesties to the National War Memorial where a massed choir will sing three verses of "O Valley Heart" and pipers will play a lament for the fallen. Massed buglers will sound the Last Post. After the King and Queen will sound Reveille and the King will then unveil the monument.

Senators and members of the Commons and their wives will be the only guests at the parliamentary dinner that evening apart from the royal retinue and the Governor-General and Lady Tweedsmuir. The King and Queen will return to Government House for a private luncheon with Their Excellencies.

There will be a state ceremony at Parliament that afternoon. If the houses have completed their sessional work at that date the King will prorogue Parliament in the traditional ceremony. If the houses plan only to adjourn, His Majesty will give royal assent to a number of bills. A special bill is before Parliament now to provide a great seal for the occasion.

King's Birthday

After a private dinner at Government House with Their Excellencies, the King and Queen will have their only free evening in Ottawa. The following day, Saturday, May 20, will be celebrated nationally as the King's birthday. The Dominion Government has proclaimed a statutory holiday. Government offices and most shops will remain closed in the capital and a great throng is expected to attend the traditional ceremony of Trooping the Colors on Parliament Hill Saturday morning.

ince, as well as to the generally of the electors, although I say with its present constitution the Government and the Legislature might be expected to carry on to the limit of its technical jurisdiction and technical term of life, I may say that in spite of these facts, the present Government and the present Legislature has no desire to act in that way. (Applause.)

"We are accused many times of being dictators of acting in an irresponsible fashion. Yet this Government wishes to rule and to govern with the full confidence of the people of the province, or not at all.

"Wants 'Full Confidence'"

"We are, I believe, at a stage of our policies and programs which particularly require the full confidence of the people in order to carry them out in a satisfactory and economical manner. In two respects in particular, I believe this to be true: In the first place, with regard to our policy of highway improvement, and our policy of sub-grading and hard-surfacing the main trunk highways of the province, roads leading to the National Park with other developments on feeder roads, and a progressive improvement of the secondary roads of the province.

"We have not left the formation of our policy in that respect until election year. We have done a considerable amount of work. We have paved approximately 88 miles of highway exclusive of the completion of the trans-Canada highway, which was done the first year when we came into office.

"In our three full years of office, as I say, we have paved approximately 88 miles of highways. Approximately 50 miles are under contract for hard-surfacing in the present season.

"In addition to the 88 miles which we have paved, over 90 miles have been sub-graded, gravelled, drained and ditched and practically ready for hard-surfacing.

"We have planned extensions of this sub-grading and paving work in order to complete our policy of hard-surfacing the main trunk highways of the province.

Time Opportune

"We believe that our policy is sound in that respect. We have provided an adequate sinking fund for the retirement of the necessary borrowings. But we were criticised by certain sections of the press in certain quarters of the public that we are spending too much money in this direction. Now, if this is true, now is the time, I believe, that we should find out and I believe that the time is opportune to ask the people of the province for an expression of public confidence in our policy of sub-grading and hard-surfacing. (Applause.)

"We have during the past three years also endeavored to formulate policies for the assistance of needy farmers and fishermen. This has been an extensive and difficult problem. We have now reached a stage when we have been able to formulate a systematic, comprehensive program for the rehabilitation of sub-standard farms and of distressed farmers in the province.

"That policy will involve the expenditure of a considerable amount of public money. We feel that, in order to carry such a policy into effect in a non-partisan, systematic and economical way, it is necessary that we obtain the confidence of the day to enjoy the full confidence of the people of the province.

"Other Reasons"

"For these reasons, and for many others which I might mention, the Government has taken the private members of the House into its confidence. We have informally arrived at a decision to submit our administration and policies for the approval of the people of the province at a general election.

"I have informally conferred with His Honour the Lieutenant Governor and have informally advised him of our intention in this respect. He has obtained the express permission of His Honour the Lieutenant Governor to advise this House of our intention in that respect.

"Shortly following the prorogation of the House a formal meeting of the Executive Council will be held, and after that meeting His Honour the Lieutenant Governor will be formally advised and requested to pass an Order-in-Council for the dissolution of the Assembly and take the necessary steps for the calling of a general provincial election to be held on Thursday, the 19th of May.

"He concluded by expressing, at some length, his 'confidence in the verdict of the electors.'

Included. Havas said, declarations by anti-aggression signatories that Germany and Germany alone is the power against whom Britain and France have pledged to Poland and Rumania.)

Spanish Problem

Official quarters were pleased by evidences of preparations to ship large numbers of Italian troops from Spain. There was still concern, however, at the presence of German and Italian experts in seaports and air ports of north-west Spain.

Sir John Anderson on behalf of the Government rejected a plan to build deep air raid shelters as "impracticable," but promised to increase production of individual "family dog houses" little steel backyard shelters.

Many had expected Winston Churchill, wartime minister of munitions to get the supply ministry, which he had advocated, and when Mr. Chamberlain announced the Burgin appointment, opposition Liberal Geoffrey Manderson questioned.

Would it not be possible to appoint to this new office some government supporter who has always been consistently right, instead of one who has always been consistently wrong?

Mr. Chamberlain did not reply. It is believed that Mr. Churchill will enter the cabinet shortly, possibly as Lord President of the Council. A post now held by Viscount Runciman. Robert Hudson, overseas trade secretary, and Captain Euan Wallace, financial secretary to the treasury, were mentioned as possible successors at the transport office. Reuters News Agency said Capt. Wallace was the likely choice.

The government had been faced with a tremendous influx of new recruits and an inadequate supply of light and heavy arms for them. Dr. Burgin will be expected to expand the production of rifles, automatic arms, light cannon, anti-tank and heavy guns, as well as the manufacture of motorized equipment.
