# WILL ATTEMPT TO BETTER OWN RECORD

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Sir Malcolm Campbell, British driver who seeks an automobile speed record of 300 miles per hour as his ultimate goal, will drive his new Bluebird racer over the Salsdore Lake bed near Salt Lake City, Utah, in August in an attempt to smash the mark of 272.108 miles an hour he now holds.

Definite assurance that Sir Malcolm, who raised the record for the fourth time at Daytona Beach, Fla., last February, will try again on the Utah course, was received from the racer here yesterday by cable to the contest board of the American Automobile Association, governing body of the speed sport in this country.

The Salsdore Lake bed, presenting a smooth course of several miles, offers an unusual opportunity for increasing the record. The surface is a deposit of natural mineral salts, hard packed and provides increased distance both for getting up speed before the start and for slowing down after completion of the measured mile as well as additional safety factors.

Sir Malcolm's cablegram to the A. A. A. said that he was leaving on a big game hunting trip to South Africa and that during his absence mechanics and engineers would prepare the giant Bluebird for the new test. By design the car is capable of a technical speed of 300 miles an hour.

# Wolves Victory Puts Beavers Out Of Playoff Berth

## Halifax Squad Ram In Three Goals In Final Period For 4-1 Victory.

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Feb. 12.—A whirlwind last-period attack netted Halifax Wolverines three goals tonight and gave them a 4-1 victory over Saint John Beavers to keep them on the fall of the first-place Moncton Hawks in the Maritime Hockey League.

Wolves won left them three points behind the Hawks, who held their scant advantage tonight as they handed out a 2-1 trimming to the third-place Charlottetown Abbies on Moncton ice.

It was an easy win for the fast-travelling Wolves, who drew ahead in the first period and had the edge of play throughout, except for a brief flurry in the second period when the Beavers burnt through for their single marker. The home-iceers came back in the third session to score three goals in little more than seven minutes.

Play was slow in the first period, with the teams playing strong defensive hockey. Forwards of both teams had difficulty in piercing the opposing defensive barrier, though Halifax had the edge in this respect. Wolves' front line gave Wilson 15 shots, while Sargent was called on to make only five saves.

The lone goal of the period came just around the half-way mark. Beavers were a man short, with Draper in the penalty box, 80 seconds into the game, when defenceman Frankie Lavigne took the puck after a face-off and shot down the ice alone.

Twisting through the defence, he whistled a hard drive at Wilson, who dropped to the ice to make the stop. As the goalie fell, Shields skated in picked up the rebound, and lifted it over the prostrate Wilson into the twine.

The game grew more lively in the second period, Halifax still had the edge of play, but Saint John made a desperate rally half way through the period that brought them up on even terms with the second-place team.

Like the first goal, this one was tallied while the other team was man short. Centre Bill Cowley, Halifax, the league's leading scorer was doing time when Foster Dickson and the Houston went down the ice together with the puck.

Cowley passed the Halifax defence, Houston slipped a pass to Dickson and the Beaver forward feinted a shot at the goal. Sargent lunged outward, and as he dropped, Dickson skied a high shot into the corner of the net.

Content, apparently to hang on to their goal, Beavers slackened their attack after that, and left Halifax to press the attack. The Wolves forwards broke through time and again, but could not find the twine behind Wilson, who handled 15 stops in the period. Wolves turned on the steam in the last period. Play grew rougher, and penalties increased as the hard-checking Halifax defencemen turned back Beaver rushes. Ferguson and Houston went to the timers together, and Lavigne and Donald followed them quickly.

The period was scarcely two minutes old when the first goal came. Lawlor, Lennon and Shields went down the ice together on a gang play, and as they grouped about Wilson, Lawlor let fly a sizzler that found the draperies.

Less than four minutes later Shields came down alone. Cocked and ready for the forwards, he whistled a drive from the blue line and beat Wilson easily. Beavers were a man short, with Donald in the penalty box. The teams were at full strength again when Cowley came down the centre lane on an individual thrust four minutes later. A hard shot left his stick from far out, the St. John goalie was beaten again.

# Says European Teams Do Not Develop Their Best Skaters for Squads

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Feb. 12.—Good skaters, rather than finished hockey players, characterize Europe's hockey teams, according to Thomas Lowrey of Ottawa, manager of the touring Ottawa Shamrocks. With coach Charles Murphy and defenceman Tom McInnesy, Mr. Lowrey reached here Saturday night on the Cunard liner Antonia and was entrained for home.

The team is still in England, where several more games will be played. The players may board the liner Seydlitz Feb. 17 for New York. Already they have won 25 of 27 games played, losing one and gaining one draw.

Chief of one of the teams en route, by the Shamrocks, Mr. Lowrey said, appeared to be too hold down the Canadians score. "They play defensive hockey," he said, "and they are good checkers."

"But European hockey teams," he added, "do not develop their best skaters into hockey players. Perhaps the Germans are the exception. They have the best players; the Germans play the game with their typical efficiency."

As in the United States, Mr. Lowrey noted, many Canadian importations were to be found among the European players. "The English teams," he said "have no English players—all are Canadians." Berlin's games against the Shamrocks were noted by Canadian players.

# ENGLAND WINS FROM IRELAND 13-3

(C. P. Cable) DUBLIN, Feb. 11.—England today set an unbeaten record of two straight victories in International hockey by virtue of their 13-3 victory over Ireland here Saturday, cheered before a crowd of 40,000.

The Irish scored first, before the game was more than a few minutes old, but thereafter despite the excellent work of the Irish forwards, English not only put up an unbreakable defence but made the Irish defence in turn look bad at times.

BOSBERG, Norway, Feb. 11.—Frank Stack of Winnipeg, today won the 1,500-metre race of the International Skating Meet, being held here and placed fourth in another event, while Alex Hurd, the Londoner, star, could get no better than fifth place in each event.

Stack romped home in the 1,500-metre race in two minutes, 29 3/10 seconds while Hurd's time was 2:52 1/10.

# Dartmouth University Is Winner

H., Feb. 12.—Representatives of Dartmouth University were being feted tonight after they had sprung a grand surprise over Ottawa, Montreal, New Hampshire and other college sportsmen by winning their own intercollegiate winter sports union championship in the carnival meet concluded here Saturday night.

New Hampshire, which led Friday after the first day of the meet, was shut out of Saturday's competition but retained second place with 24 points, 11 behind Dartmouth. St. Patrick's of Ottawa was third with 17 points. McGill University scored 14 points, Ottawa University eight and Cornell one.

# Cunningham Wins Easily

(By William King Associated Press Sports Writer by Guardian's Special Wire) BOSTON, Feb. 12.—Glen Cunningham, manager of United States teams, tonight was just about convinced that until Jack Lovelock, the New Zealand wonder returns for another American campaign, there is little competition on this side of the ocean.

In the feature event of the 45th annual Boston A. A. Games Saturday night Cunningham breezed home 35 yards ahead of Dean Woolley of Boston, in the four-man Hunter mile.

This classic, generally the high spot of the competition, was a washout as far as the 10,000-odd spectators were concerned. Announcing beforehand that he was not ready to out loose for a record attempt, the powerful Kansas, who has his mind on next week's Baxter mile competition against Bill Bonithron, holder of the American record, merely ran 12 times around the Garden track in four minutes 12 2/5 seconds.

At no time was his opposition, Woolley, Carl Oson of Philadelphia, last year's winner, and Frank Crowley of Manhattan, capable of making any kind of a threat.

# MAY HAVE OPPORTUNITY AT OLYMPICS

B., Feb. 12.—That Canadian girls may have opportunity to display their ability on the steel blades at future Olympic skating meets, was the belief expressed here tonight by Lela Brooks of Toronto, former woman's senior in the Canadian indoor speed skating meet here tomorrow and Tuesday nights.

Tests have been held for women speedsters at past Olympic skating meets but never actual championships, Miss Brooks pointed out. I honestly believe that the 1936 Olympic skating meet in Norway will find women contestants and if such is the case there will be no stopping the Canadian girls."
