THE PROVINCIAL ELECTIONS YESTERDAY.

In the provincial elections yesterday the Conservative Government and party achieved a remarkable victory. It is beyond precedent in its sweep. Probably very few, if any, in either party had expected the return of the Liberal party to power as the result of the contest, but it was thought by a good many that there might be from eight to ten of the party candidates elected. So complete a Conservative sweep as is now shown was not anticipated by the most sanguine of the ministerial party. In this city, especially, the Liberal defeat assumes the proportions of a total rout.

The people had evidently made up their minds that the recent overturn both at Ottawa and in this Province was a timely and auspicious one and gave their votes accordingly. Premier Mathieson and his colleagues in the Government are entitled to congratulations on their victory, to which the Premier's able and efficient leadership had contributed so very largely. Still the Guardian cannot withhold its regrets for some good men defeated and also for the fact that the Liberal Opposition in the new House will be too weak to render as good service as it might otherwise have been in a position to do. The best working of our representative institutions has been hitherto found where the Opposition strength has been about one third or more of the total membership. Premier Mathieson will have almost an embarrassment of riches in the too large support which the people

from Charlottetown, is the proposed new port, and the proposal of the Coal Company and of the citizens of Wallace is that their port shall be connected with the Intercolonial Railway and equipped for the shipment of coal. They want the Dominion Government to connect the I. C. R. with the waterfront at Wallace, between two and three miles distant, at a cost of, say, \$150,000 and also to do some necessary dredging. That done, the coal company will be prepared to construct wharves and a plant to cost \$200,000 and capable of shipping 200,000 tons of Springhill coal yearly. This would apparently be a good thing for Springhill, Wallace and for the schooner trade between Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. A deputiation of the coal interests and Wallace citizens is now in Ottawa to urge forward the project.

THE PATRIOT AND THE FERRY.

Just on the eve of the election the esteemed Patriot accepted the Car Ferry as a boon to this Province which will materialize in the near future. It accepted Premier Borden's pledge "in good faith," banished its previous doubts as to the possibility of the new project being only an ordinary ferry, and became "convinced that Premier Borden means business" and much more of the same sort. All of which we record with pleasure.

There was in the same issue the usual letter in which the electors were warned "not to listen to the election promises of R. L. Borden in regard to grants for public improvement—these are only election promises and like pie crusts are easily broken. When Mr. Borden made these promises he knew he could not fulfil them for the simple reason that every other Province would demand the same concessions." The correspondent at least was not very enthusiastic for the ferry. Possibly the editor might have kept back the letter if he had just then been thinking of his pledge that "The Patriot will do all in its power to support the establishment of a Car Ferry."

But we will not be over-critical of this episode, especially at election time. The essence of the situation is that the press of the Province is united for the ferry and the people are practically all enthusiastic in favor of it. Those who were doubters at first are now convinced that we want it and that it is coming. It means the expenditure of some millions in changing the gauge of the P. E. Island Railway and the construction of terminals on both sides of the Straits, which will give employment to labor while the work is going on, but the chief gain will be in the improved transportation facilities for which the Province has waited so long and so patiently.

PROPOSED NEW COAL PORT.

A year ago the Dominion Coal Co. bought the Springhill coal mines from the Cumberland Railway and have now a project to secure a ship-having port on the Straits of Northumberland with a view to the coal trade of Prince Edward Island, Montreal and St. Lawrence ports. Wallace, which is just across the Strait

THE PRESS TELEGRAPH SERVICE. In Europe and America the telegraphic news of the world is compiled and distributed through the news papers by press associations, whose business is conducted on a vast scale. For many years the Canadian newspapers were mainly dependent upon the Associated Press of the United States for this service, but more recently the Canadian Associated Press was formed, which renders a much more suitable service for the people of this country. The news it collects and distributes is more general and less exclusively about American affairs. Formerly a very large proportion of the telegraphic news printed in Canada told of happenings in the States and was sometimes anti-British or anti-Canadian in tone.

THE CANADIAN PRESS ASSOCIATION.

The Canadian Press Association in catering to the newspapers of the Dominion provides a different compilation of news for the West and East of the Dominion and for this purpose the service for the Eastern Provinces is under the direction of what is known as the Eastern Press Association. The Guardian is now a member of both the Canadian and the Eastern Press Associations. It is needless to say that this service obtained at increased cost has considerably increased our facilities for obtaining late, full and reliable telegraphic news for the benefit of our readers.

THE MAILS

Great credit is due to all concerned for the excellent mail service this Province has enjoyed during the holiday season and since. In times past the transfer of the mail service from the Navigation Company's steamers to the winter boats was often fruitful of great irregularities and delays, which have been happily avoided this year. No doubt the season has been a favorable one, but after making all due allowance for this fact, it seems to be the universal opinion that the mail service is being handled in an efficient and business like manner.

WILL OF LATE NEIL NICHOLSON.

This is the last will and testament of me Neil P. Nicholson, of Cardigan Head, King's County, in Prince Edward Island, farmer and trader. I hereby revoke all other or former wills and testamentary dispositions by me at any time heretofore made, and declare this only to contain my last will and testament. I direct all my just debts, funeral and testamentary expenses to be paid and satisfied by my executor hereinafter named as soon as conveniently may be after my decease. I devise the eastern half of my farm, situate at Cardigan Head aforesaid, and consisting of one hundred acres, to my wife Belle Nicholson, for her natural life, and after her decease the same is hereby devised to my nephew Neil P. Nicholson, who now resides with me, and his heirs. The remaining fifty acres of my said farm I hereby devise to the said Neil P. Nicholson and his heirs. And whereas the said Neil P. Nicholson has here-by devised to him the portion of my dwelling house and barn and outbuildings I do hereby direct that my said wife Belle Nicholson shall during her natural life have the use of the said dwelling house, barn and outbuildings in common with the said Neil P. Nicholson.

I bequeath to Mrs. Neil P. Nicholson four cows.

I bequeath to my said wife Belle Nicholson a one-half interest in all the residue of my farm stock and farming implements, to hold the same for and during her natural life, and after the decease of my said wife, the same to go to the said Neil P. Nicholson absolutely. The remaining one-half interest in the residue of my farm stock and farming implements I bequeath to the said Neil P. Nicholson absolutely.

I bequeath to my said wife Belle Nicholson all my household furniture, beds and bedding and all other articles of personal or domestic use or ornament, to hold the same during her natural life, and at her death the same to become the property of the said Neil P. Nicholson absolutely.

I bequeath the following legacies, that is to say: To my wife, Belle Nicholson, two thousand dollars.

To Mrs. Neil P. Nicholson, five hundred dollars.

To Christy Nicholson, daughter of Neil P. Nicholson, three hundred dollars when she attains the age of twenty-one years.

To my brother, Murdock Nicholson, five hundred dollars.

To Donald Nicholson of Morell, P. E. I., five hundred dollars.

To Alexander Nicholson, son of Murdock Nicholson, one thousand dollars.

To John Nicholson, student, son of my brother, John Nicholson, two hundred dollars.

To my niece, Belle Richards, of Murray Harbour, one hundred dollars.

To Mrs. Olive Bears, my niece, one hundred dollars.

To Mary Nicholson, daughter of Murdock Nicholson, fifty dollars.

To my niece, Sarah Nicholson, daughter of Murdock Nicholson, one hundred dollars.

To Samuel Nicholson, son of Peter Nicholson, five hundred dollars.

To Alexander Nicholson, Peter Nicholson's son, one hundred dollars.

To Christina Nicholson, daughter of Murdock Nicholson, fifty dollars.

To Angus Nicholson, son of Neil P. Nicholson, two hundred dollars when he attains the age of twenty-one years.

To Angus P. Nicholson, daughter of Peter Nicholson, one hundred dollars.

To Sarah Nicholson, daughter of John Nicholson, fifty dollars.

I direct that three hundred dollars shall be invested and the interest arising therefrom shall be paid annually to the Presbyterian Church at Cardigan so long as the said church at Cardigan shall exist.

I devise to Alexander Nicholson (Murdock Nicholson's son) and his heirs twenty-five acres of land situate at Cardigan in said county, said land being bounded as follows: On the north by the Cardigan River; on the west by John McAtley's land; on the east by land occupied by D. G. Morrison, and on the south by land occupied by Allan Shaw.

I hereby direct that my executor hereinafter named shall sell and convert into money all my interest in the firm of Nicholson & McLaren at Cardigan aforesaid, and also my business stand at Cardigan aforesaid, consisting of plot of land on which are situate a store and warehouse, and to divide the proceeds arising from such sale as follows; one half to my said wife Belle Nicholson and the remaining one-half to be divided share and share alike among the following persons, namely: Alexander Nicholson, son of Murdock Nicholson; Neil P. Nicholson, and my brother Murdock Nicholson. I hereby direct that all the residue of my personal estate shall be divided by my executor hereinafter named share and share alike among all the legatees herebefore mentioned in this my last will and testament.

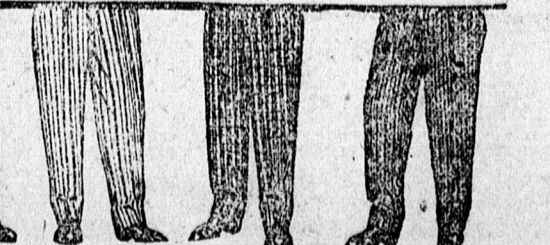

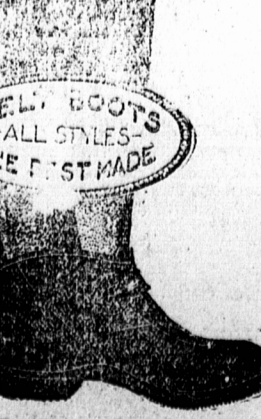
