The recording secretary's report gave a resume of the work and the various activities of the Auxiliary during the year.

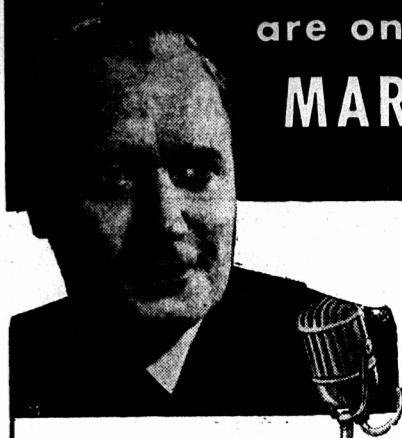

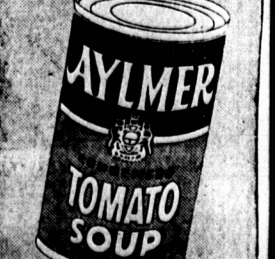
