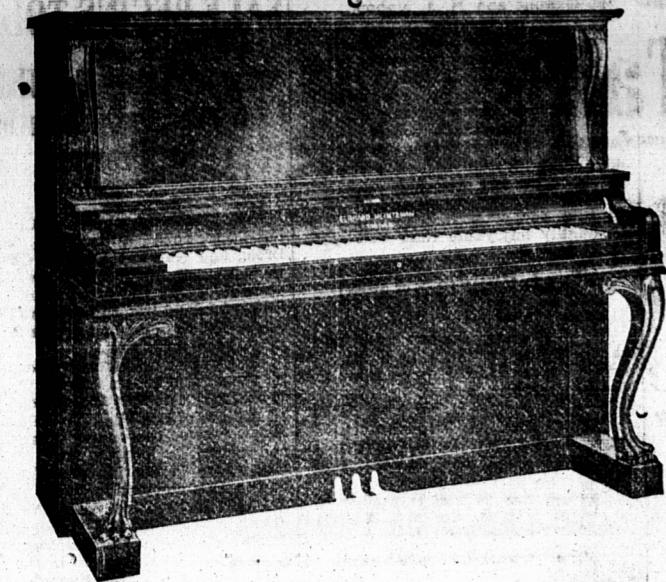


MORE INDUCEMENTS FOR

WINNIPEG "VETS" SOUND WARNING

WINNIPEG, June 27.—A statement issued tonight, John Newton, vice-president of the Winnipeg Branch of the G. W. V. A., says: "There are two main enemies to peace and prosperity in Canada today, one just as bad as the other, and both really of the same type, viz., the profiteers among capitalists and the 'reds' among the labor. It is clearly the duty of the G. W. V. A., to see that the activities of both are brought to a close. "The strike has not been an un-mixed evil by any manner or means. It has awakened the people from their apathetic slumbers; it has shown the government that the problems of the undesirable alien, the profiteer and the high cost of living must be satisfactorily handled immediately, and that if the present government is unable to fill the bill, another government must take its place; in other words the present strike has focussed public attention on what the G. W. V. A. has been urging on the government for months."

Mr. Frank Tierney, Sect. Treas. and Mr. Philip Palmer, member of the Executive of the Charlottetown Branch attended the meeting and after a short discourse from the former giving a general outline of the organization, the boys immediately got to work and formed a Branch. The following officers were elected:—President E. H. Strong. 1st Vice W. J. Whitney. 2nd Vice Bradford Beer. Sect. Treas. Reginald Ellis. The remainder of the Executive, were also elected as well as several working committees. The newly-elected President gave a short address pointing out the urgent need of a Branch in that place, and mentioning many matters of business, which should be taken up right away as well as the social side of the Organization. The meeting then adjourned for two weeks after the Executive and other committees had agreed to meet the following night, with a view to working out such details as acquiring a club room and raising a small sum of money to better carry on their share of the work of this great organization. HUTTERITES IN CANADA

Unless the Dominion Government appoints a judicial royal commission to investigate all the circumstances of, and to fix the responsibility for the Hutterite migration into Canada, the Winnipeg Great War Veterans will seek powers to form a delegation to go to Washington, District of Columbia, to find out just what "international complications" may ensue should Canada bar these aliens of German descent as undesirable. This course of action was decided upon at a general meeting of the Winnipeg branch of the Great War Veterans, and the executive immediately approached the Dominion executive for powers to negotiate with the Canadian Club of Winnipeg and other representative patriotic bodies with a view to forming a delegation to Washington. It was felt at the meeting that the Federal Government was merely "bluffing" on its statement that international complications would ensue if the large colony of Hutterites waiting at the border were obstructed. Yet it was felt that the association could not afford to adopt "force" methods in its determination to keep these people of Canada as that might really cause complications. The objection to the Hutterites is based on the fact that they are of German extraction, conscientious objectors, and live in communities.

HENRY SMITH

Chairman of the School Board of the City of Charlottetown, P. E. I., June 27th, 1919. Mr. Seaman was completely taken by surprise. He stated that this was the first time in his long experience as a teacher that he had lost control of the school. He expressed himself as deeply grateful to the former pupils and others who had in this way shown the bond of affection which still held them together.

Mr. C. H. B. Longworth, who claimed to be one of Mr. Seaman's oldest pupils followed and paid a strong tribute to Mr. Seaman's ability as a teacher. He referred to the work accomplished by Mr. Seaman when he was a boy under his charge and Mr. Seaman's splendid work in all the years since.

WAR PRIZE WILL SAIL

HALIFAX, June 26.—The Swedish barque Svithlod, now anchored in the northwest arm is soon to sail for England. Captain Cooper, her new skipper, has arrived from England and is now busy getting things into shape for the voyage. He expects to make the trip in seventeen days.

The Svithlod was one of the prizes taken by H. M. C. S. Niobe at the beginning of the war. Bound from a South American port to Sweden, she was stopped by the cruiser and found to be carrying contraband. Later it developed that she had a German crew on board, en route for home. The case has been tried several times and in each case the owners have lost the last court deciding that the vessel was now the property of the Crown.

Mr. Johnson also referred to the loyal support accorded him by the teachers of the staff in his effort to maintain the high standard of West Kent School. In this connection he particularly mentioned the work of Miss Smith who besides attending to the regular work of her class, took charge of instruction in singing, gratuitously giving her talents in this direction towards rounding out a varied and complete course of elementary training.

Mr. Johnson also referred fittingly to the return from overseas of Col. R. H. Campbell, former Principal of the school, and among other things alluded to the Arbor and Empire Day exercises. He laid emphasis upon the significance of this day which is set apart every year in order to impress in a special manner upon the minds of the boys and girls the national value of tree planting and the inestimable privileges of British citizenship. He hoped that in future parents and citizens generally would endeavor if possible to be in attendance on this day and show by their presence their profound interest in this important national function.

The Principal paid a compliment to the excellent manner in which Mr. Dewar had looked after the school building and grounds.

Reference was also made to the introduction of medical inspection in the schools and it was pointed out that it would be fruitless unless parents on ascertaining the physical defects of their children take prompt action to have these remedied and thus allow no handicap if possible to retard their proper mental and physical development.

He referred to the fact also that a new honor roll had been placed in the school, which contained the names of all pupils who have won the Governor General's medal from the opening of the school in 1878 until the present date.

In conclusion the Principal extended thanks to the parents on behalf of the staff for their co-operation in the performance of their duties and also to the donors of prizes for their tangible expression of interest in the school, and to the members of their School Board his high appreciation for their tangible assistance as well as their program rendered gratis of four splendidly rendered choruses by the school; the presentation of diplomas and prizes. The Island Hymn and National Anthem brought to a conclusion a very successful and enjoyable programme.

The Governor General's Medal for General Proficiency was won by Wilma Johnson.
