International Nickel

A New York opinion on International Nickel states that a resumption of Canadian buying has been noted in the stock in the last two weeks. New York brokerage houses, which were prominent in this stock in the last two years, when it scored spectacular gains, have been executing some of the orders. It is contended in Wall Street that the Canadians insist that the property has great potential values, which will eventually draw more attention to the stock from American quarters.

Consolidated Mining and Smelting

Consolidated Mining and Smelting recorded a very good gain yesterday and opening today at 276, up 41 points. Three reasons have advanced to account for the recent easiness in the security. First, the investigation into the damage suit, investigated by property holders in the vicinity of the company's smelter in British Columbia, to the effect that their land has been damaged by the fumes from the company's plants. Several millions of dollars is involved in the suit. Second, the company's earnings to some extent. Third, the decline is attributed to the liquidation of a large block of stock. Interests close to the company maintain that there is no special reason to account for the drop as far as they know, so that the third assumption would appear to have the most foundation for the selling.
