F. J. Nash, Charlottetown, was a passenger returning by the Tignish express Saturday night.

A.E. MacDonald, M. L. A., Charlottetown, returned Saturday night from Summerside after attending the Supreme Court.

Prof. Douglas Steel of Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, is the guest of his parents, Rev. Geo. and Mrs. Steel, Shediac.

Saturday afternoon was a lively one at the Charlottetown race course. Fully twenty-five horses, pacers and trotters, were being trained and many spectators were enjoying the sport.

Saturday the Northumberland left Charlottetown at 8.30 a.m. for Picton with passengers, mail, express and freight and arrived at 12 noon. She left again at 5.00 p.m. with passengers, mail, express and freight and arrived at 8.20 p.m. She leaves today at 8.20 a.m. for Picton, returning at night.

The S.S. Harland now on the marine slip at Picton is not expected to come off before Thursday next, owing to the fact that there are necessary repairs to be made to the bottom which were not anticipated. They will therefore be no trip made to Orwell on Tuesday nor to Victoria on Wednesday or Thursday.

Saturday the eastern express arrived in Charlottetown at 8.15 a.m. on time, the southern express at 9.25 a.m., on time; the Cape Traverse express at 9.55 a.m., on time; the Tignish accommodation at 1.40 a.m., on time; the eastern accommodation at 6 p.m., forty minutes late and the Tignish express at 10.05 p.m., fifteen minutes late.

Interest in the appointment of a Solicitor General for Canada has been keen in this province by reason of the fact that there is a competent and eligible candidate among its representatives in the House of Commons. The following Ottawa despatch will be of interest: It is reported that Hon. A. B. Morine is to be appointed solicitor general of Canada. Mr. Morine has completed his work of investigating the transactions of the late government, and, although he discovered nothing to the discredit of the Liberals, it is recognized that his investigation was most thorough and workmanlike. The discrediting of his Newfoundland record made in the house at the close of the session undoubtedly influenced Premier Borden to obtain his resignation as chairman of the public service commission. However, Mr. Morine is too strong and adroit a man to go with out the promise of something else and it is understood that the solicitor generalship has been promised.

The dominion fruit crop report for apples is upon the whole excellent. Little bud or twig killing has been reported, and the prospects are for a favorable showing of bloom. The prospects in Ontario are good. All varieties came through the winter well. No losses are reported and the fruit buds appear to have developed well. In New Brunswick no winter losses are reported. There appears to be an increased interest in orchard ing. In the Annapolis Valley no losses from winter killing and no serious fungous diseases nor insects are reported. The tussock moth and canker worm are occasionally in evidence. Notwithstanding the large crop of last year, fruit buds have developed well. Many new orchards are coming into bearing and good orchard methods are spreading rapidly, all of which give promise of a fair crop this year. While no larger increases are expected in Prince Edward Island, the care that has been taken of the orchards and the good weather conditions, give promise of a fairly large yield. All correspondents report the orchards in good condition. The co-operative associations continue to increase. The marked feature in their history this year is the feeling among the co-operators that central selling organizations will soon be an absolute necessity. The competition among the co-operative associations themselves will soon be as harmful as that between private individuals and many of the advantages that might be gained by organization will be lost if central associations are not formed.

A system of Agricultural Credit has been in operation in Denmark. Its direct benefits to the Danish farmers have been immense, and it has facilitated the development of the great co-operative movement. Note what Prof. Jas. Robertson, well known in P. E. I., the greatest authority on agriculture in Canada has to say of the Danish farmers in a recent report of the Federal government:—"The community spirit which the Danes have in a very large measure—more than we have as yet, perhaps because of the conditions of their national life in the past—has been applied to the problems and difficulties of the farms; and so they have risen from poverty from dire overty after the war with Germany to being regarded as the most prosperous agricultural people as a whole on the face of the earth to-day. They take out of the United Kingdom over eight millions of dollars annually more than other nations obtain for an equal quantity of the same products because of the conditions on the quality of their butter, bacon and eggs than is spent on the whole system of rural education in Canada."
