

THE NEWFOUNDLAND CROPS.

SYDNEY, N. S., July 4.—Parties returning from Newfoundland this week report that the potato crop will likely prove a failure throughout the Ancient Colony this season owing to continued cold wet weather. On the southern and western shores people fear a great shortage. The fishing for the season is also reported to be behind that of previous years. Continued storms for the last three weeks have wrought much damage to the lobster traps, occasioning great loss to the fishermen.

THREATENING TO KILL.

SYDNEY, July 4.—Angus Morrison, of Sydney Forks, was arrested yesterday on a warrant charging him with threatening to kill his wife and daughter with an axe. The information against Morrison was laid by his daughter.

RETURNING HOME.

LIVERPOOL, July 3.—A portion of the contingent of Canadian troops sent to England to take part in the coronation festivities is returning home on the Allan line steamer Tuni-an; which sails for Montreal to-day. The soldiers were entertained at luncheon by the lord mayor in the town hall.

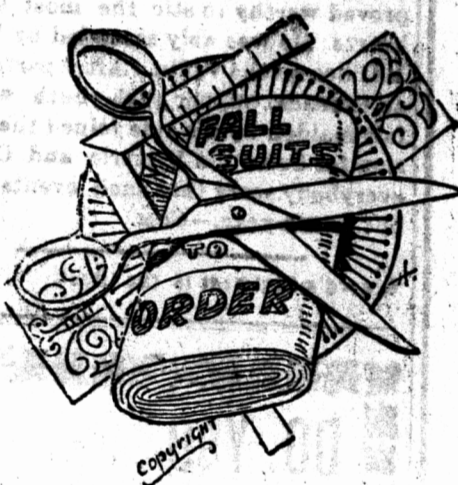

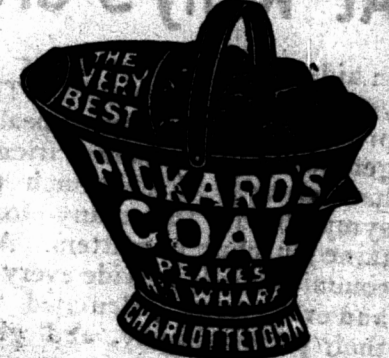
