THRILLING TALE OF SEA RESCUE

Crew of British Barkentine Ohio were Taken off Wrecked Vessel with Great Difficulty—The Gallant Rescue by Capt. Tyler of the S.S. Frederick.

LOUISBURG, Oct. 4.—Capt. Tyler, of the S. S. Frederick, tells the story of the rescue of Capt. Ed. Moore and seven members of the British brigantine Ohio, which was wrecked off Cape Hatteras on the 17th Sept. The Ohio was sighted Sunday morning at 9.30 o'clock. Distress signals were displayed, and the decks were awash. At that time heavy swells were running, and the damaged ship was buffeted about at the mercy of the waves. With the aid of glasses eight men could be seen huddled on top of the mate's cabin, which was the only part that was not under water. The sails and spars were gone and the men had on scant clothing. After getting as close to the Ohio as was considered safe, the life saving apparatus on the Frederick was prepared and the life line was shot across the wrecked brig. The line was grasped eagerly by the men on the cabin, who, in their haste pulled the line loose from the heavy rope with which it was extended to tow the men to the Frederick, a distance of about 200 yards. Another line was shot across and this time the large rope was hauled safely to the men threatened to a watery grave. So tempestuous was the sea that not only was the use of the small boats out of the question, but even the breeches buoy could not be used, and the men were hauled through the water. Two were hauled on board the first haul, three the next and three the last time. Capt. Moore was the last to leave the ship, and even then insisted that he wanted to stay on board and wait another day in the hope that the sea would go down, and he would be sighted by some vessel that could assist him in getting his charts and personal effects, which represented the savings of a life time. The captain was finally persuaded to leave his foundering ship, and went aboard the Frederick. He was almost heart-broken.

During the work of rescue passengers of the Frederick remained on the deck all the while, although the majority were frightened so badly that they kept huddled together in the state rooms and saloons. There were forty-seven passengers on the Frederick. Six or eight hours were consumed in getting the men to the deck of the steamship, and during this time the rail on the first deck of the steamer was constantly awash, and many of the state rooms were flooded. Capt. Tyler stated that he could stand on the bridge and dip water from the sea with a bucket at times, so high did the swell run.

As soon as the rescue was effected the Frederick resumed the voyage to Savannah. Capt. Tyler said that he sighted several derelics. On one of these he made out the name of Francis E. Tunnel, with her sails blown away. The crew was still on board and when signalled replied that no assistance was needed. Another schooner a four-master, whose name was not learned was sighted in a badly damaged state. The deck cargo

had been washed away, the sails were gone and some of the spars were missing. The captain signalled that he needed no assistance. Monday afternoon a cargo of lumber was sighted drifting with the tide.

The Frederick was not damaged in the slightest further than being water-soaked in many of the cabins and saloons.
