Dail Adopts St. Lawrence The Emergency Waterway And Tariff Bill The Maritimes

DUBLIN, July 23.—(Canadian Press Cable)—The Dail Eireann in special session tonight adopted the government's emergency tariff bill after refusing to accept a senate amendment. The bill becomes law immediately.

President Eamon De Valera's government may now levy duties on any amount on imports from Great Britain. The measure was designed to answer the 20 percent duties levied by Britain on Free State goods following Mr. De Valera's decision to withhold the land annuities.

In adopting the bill tonight, the Dail rejected a senate recommendation to delete the important first section. This section empowered the Government to impose stamp taxes on documents used in transactions, and was aimed at British insurance companies doing business in the Free State.

Patrick McGillivray, former Minister for External Affairs and a leading opponent of the bill, asserted it would affect a Canadian insurance company which is one of the largest operating in the Free State. He brought the Imperial Economic Conference into the debate by referring to the fact that Free State delegates joined in a message to the King adopted at Ottawa yesterday. Only a year ago, he declared, Sean O'Kelly, now head of the delegation at Ottawa, had described such messages as "hog-wash."

Despite protests from the opposition the debate today on the Senate's action was cut short.

The council gave the suggestion unanimous endorsement and appointed Mayor William Fitzgerald as its delegate to the meeting.

Dictatorship Re Canada's Rlys. Not Likely

OTTAWA, July 23.—(By The Canadian Press)—A dictatorship to control Canada's two railroad systems is most unlikely according to Hon. R. J. Manion, Minister of Railways and Canals. The report had been sent from Ottawa that the Royal commission on transportation would make a recommendation that a so-called "dictator" be named who would have authority over both systems.

"I had no idea of the suggestions of the Royal Commission," said Dr. Manion, "but a dictatorship is most unlikely." It was learned today that the Royal Commission has not yet reached any decision on the major questions which it is considering. It will meet in August when complete data will be before it and these questions will be taken up.

Tramps Blamed For Bad Fire

TRURO, N. S., July 23.—(By the Canadian Press)—Tramps were blamed for a fire that destroyed a building owned by Irving Davis, the public hall and a barn, at Five Islands, and threatened the village for an hour today. The fire started in the barn and spread quickly to the other buildings.

Pontiac Lake Gives Up Dead

PONTIAC, Mich., July 23.—(A.P.)—Bodies of two women came to the surface in Pontiac Lake tonight, bringing to three the known fatalities from a sudden storm which swamped dozens of small boats last night. Sheriff Frank Schram of Oakland County said he believed seven more were in the lake. The bodies of Mrs. Green Scales and Mrs. Ethel McKinley, negroes, both of Pontiac, were recovered tonight. The body of William Burnowski, Detroit prize fighter, was washed ashore last night. Three other Pontiac negroes have not returned to their homes and an automobile reported to have taken four or five persons from Detroit to the lake has not been claimed. Sheriff Schram said the bodies probably were caught on fallen trees and brush which litter the bottom of the artificial lake, lying seven miles from here.

Russia's Methods Of Marketing Wheat Questioned

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, July 23.—A desire for full discussion with the British government of the nature of the action that might be adopted to counteract Russia's methods of marketing wheat is demanded by Rt. Hon. Stanley M. Bruce, head of the Australian delegation, in a memorandum issued to the Imperial Conference here today. Mr. Bruce declares that no form of overseas competition has aroused such strong feeling amongst Australian wheat growers "as the dumping of Russian wheat into Great Britain." The Australian leader believes this matter to be of great concern to the wheat producers, not only of Australia, but of Canada. It is impossible by Mr. and Mrs. Bruce to be the extent of Russian competition and its effects in the future. Having this in view, Mr. Bruce has placed the issue squarely before the conference.

Ferguson On Way To Parley

OTTAWA, July 23.—(By The Canadian Press)—Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, Canadian High Commissioner to London, is expected in Ottawa at an early date for the Imperial Conference. Matters arising out of the Lausanne Conference, to which he was Canadian delegate, are detaining Mr. Ferguson in London.
